





"Give Us This Day" turns out to be a popular title with publishers this season. By one of those coincidences which, happily, turn up infrequently, both Hanover House and Norton are publishing books with this title.

The Hanover House "Give Us This Day", published on Oct. 8. is by Father James Keller, founder and director of the Christophers, is prepared for lay people who desire to bring Christian principles into the marketplace. Arranged chronologically, it contains a Christopher thought for each day of the year.

The Norton "Give Us This Day" to be published Jan. 7, is by Sidney Stewart, and is the firsthand account of the author's experiences as a Japanese prisoner for three years. Although Stewart is an American, the book has already been a best seller in four European languages and is now published for the first time in the author's native land.

By a further coincidence, both books have remarkably similar jackets, each having a large ircle as its focal point.

Hanover and Norton apologize for any confusion caused to book buyers and book reviewers and recommend as the best solution to any confusion the purchase of both books.

A mystery novel, "The Golden Ballast," by Anthony Hodgson, which was announced for publication on October 15 by the New York firm of Bouregy & Curl, was discovered to be a virtual word-for-word copy of "Tender to Danger," by Eliot Reed, which was published by Doubleday in 1951.

The discovery was made by Anthony Boucher, mystery reviewer for the New York "Times Book Review", who alerted Doubleday to the facts. Bouregy and Curl made every effort to recall all copies of the book, and have employed lawyers to locate the author in British Columbia.

Since Mr. Boucher discovered the plagiarism, Doubleday has received letters from readers in New York, Massachusetts, and Connecticut, all of them calling attention to the remarkable similarity between the two books.

Make Like The Yankees

The rough and tough grind of pro basketball, a melange of gruelling competition and travel, can be extremely hard to handle — but they've made it harder. The Boston Celtics are taking charge.

It's like the man said about the poorhouse— "It's bad enough living there, but they have to put a hill in front of it to make things worse." That's the way the teams in the National Basketball Association must feel, for the grind has been difficult enough in the past when it was anybody's race. This year, the Boston club which already had Bob Cousy has added Bill Russell, the former Frisco sensation — and now the opposition feels as if it's climbing the hill to the poorhouse.

On the other hand, the Celtics provide an imitation of the rich getting richer. They had Cousy and some handy surrounding talent before, they came up with Russell who shapes up as money in the bank, and on top of all that, they have Frank Ramsay returning to the club after coming out of service, the former college star also being certain to help the Boston cause. So, those unhappy rivals in the NBA want to know: What else do they need?

Russell, wanted by every pro basketball club in the country, was a sure-fire to click in the league despite the difficulties of making the jump from amateur to professional ranks. As all the NBA players will tell you, without hesitation, a world of difference lies between the two. However, Big Bill—with his height and springs in his legs, has started off in mighty powerful fashion.

Besides his scoring ability — which figures to improve — Russell has demonstrated important defensive skill and terrific ability to get the ball off the backboards. Rebounding and defense are two items which seldom are stressed by players moving into pro ball but which have tremendous im-


portance in swaying the result of the games. Russell, in his short time with the Boston club, already has proven exceedingly helpful and he figures to be even more valuable as he acquires added experience.

The presence of Russell with his ability to get that ball and Cousy's allaround drive, key play, and shotmaking will add up to imposing assets and the Celtics, already at the top of the pack, are expected to widen the gap between themselves and pursuers as the race continues. Of course, the NBA schedule with its long hops and considerable wear and tear on the nervous system, hardly is designed for uninterrupted winning streaks but the Celtics have the possibilities — if anybody has.

The Boston team, nicely ensconced in first place as it holds the division lead, is pointing for further championship laurels when the playoffs arrive. The Celtics are certain to get stronger rather than weaker as the season progresses and there is little chance of upsetting this cart. They just have too much with Russell and Cousy as the aces. Bob, of course, is only the best player in the league. Adding Russell to Cousy's name in the lineup was just a perfect case of gilding the lily.

Of course, the other teams in the circuit will go through the motions of trying to dam off those Boston victories and will be trying to come up with enough surprises to stem the tide. But, as is usually the case with tides, the waves will keep rolling and wearing away everything standing in the way.

. So, look for those Celtics to get stronger and more so — as the years roll by. The other clubs in the league will be in the same position as the teams in the baseball majors, who have the problem of stopping the New York Yankees. Those Yankees keep winning those American League pennants and

almost all the time, adding the World Series as well. The same promises to be true of the Celtics from here on in.

The Philadelphia Warriors held all the trump cards last year when they topped the circuit in their releatless march through the ranks. However, they lost Tom Gola who had been the extra spark and the additional ace needed to pick up the pot. Gola had come out of college ranks where he was the All America standout, in the same fashion that Russell was the big gun of All America stature at San Francisco.

However, big Tom went into service and the Warriors lost that "extra" which made them tough to stop. While they were trying to recapture the touch, the Celtics took charge and moved into first place. Along came Russell and that was the "convincer". It will be extremely interesting to see if they lose that momentum once Gola returns to the Philadelphia lineup.

That's future-book speculation, however. In the meantime, Boston is out in front and promising to open up the gap to giant proportions while Philadelphia and New York are in futile bids to cut down the margin. The Knicks have been trying to attain top stature for many years but while always being in the picture, just haven't had enough to make it all the way.

Certainly, the New York entry hardly seems to pose a strong threat this year. The Knicks have been riding a seesaw, sometimes up and sometimes down. The odds are that they will hold that uncomfortable seat for the balance of the campaign. It's hardly as happy a perch as that occupied by the Celtics. They're in the driver's seat.

Don't Buy The Brooklyn Bridge!

Half a century or so ago swindlers preyed runnlessly on fresh-off-the-boat immigrants to this country. A great coup was to sell one of these innocents the Brooklyn Bridge.

Times and techniques have changed. Nowadays swindlers have subtler rackets — one of them being fraudulent and worthless stocks. Mounting complaints against unscrupulous stock salesmen led the Securities and Exchange Commission and the New York State Attorney General to work out, with the aid of stock exchanges and reputable brokerage houses, a guide to prospective stock buyers. It has now been issued, and it is as sound as it is simple. Here are the basic rules:

Think before buying. Deal only with a securities firm which you know. Be skeptical of securities offered by telephone by a firm or a salesman you don't know. Guard against high pressure sales methods. Be particularly wary of promises of quick and spectacular price rises. Be sure you understand that there is a risk of loss as well as a prospect of gain when you buy securities. Get all the facts-never buy on tips or rumors. Request the person offering securities over the phone to mail you written information about the corporation, its operations, management, financial position, etc., and save this for future reference. If you don't fully understand the written information, consult someone who does.

Follow this guide — and you won't be buying Brooklyn Bridges!

The Why Of "Tight Money"

You've undoubtedly heard of the "tight money" policy now being followed by the Federal Reserve Board policy which makes money more difficult to borrow and which tends to increase interest rates.

But you may have wondered why the Board should find such a policy necessary. U. S. News & World Report explains in these words: "There is at present a strong inflationary demand for credit. Industry is seeking record amounts to finance huge expansion programs. State and local governments have vast programs of public works. Builders are pressing for funds to fi-

nance more homes. Consumers are spending record sums, and want to borrow to keep on spending. Meanwhile, most of the labor force is already fully occupied and unions are demanding and getting wage increases. Many production lines are operating at capacity. With costs increasing and prices rising, the possibility of greater inflation threatens.

"The men on the Federal Reserve Board who shape money policy for the government are determined to keep this situation under control."

The Home Wiring Problem

In millions of homes all over America this past Christmas, fuses blew, lights dimmed, pictures on TV screens flickered, roasters took an annoying long time to heat up, electricity bills were pushed to unnecessarily high levels. There's a very good chance that happened to you - a staggering 78 to 90 per cent of America's homes are not adequately wired. At least 20 million homes need rewiring in the near future while millions more need wiring modernization.

The reason, of course, is found in the labor-saving appliances which all American families want, and which they have been buying in tremendous volume. We are putting heavy and often excessive strains on the wiring capacity of the home. And this isn't just a problem of the owners of older homes-newly-built homes, too, frequently fall into the inadequately wired classification.

A spokesman for the Edison Electric Institute has said: "We'll be on the way to licking the problem when home buyers check on wiring as automatically as they check on the number of bedrooms and bathrooms." We Americans are going to want more and more appliances as time wears on. We must get ready for them.






