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

But the dawn of a new year, for some undefinable reason, brings the changeless gift of God to all men's hearts — Hope.


This priceless gift must be cherished and preserved else life would be hollow and without meaning.

SOUTHPAWS CAST MAGIC SPELL IN ABC TOURNEY

SYRACUSE, N. Y. — There was a time when the lefthanded bowler was tagged as an ugly duckling of the tenpin sport. He was a miscast individual, unpredictable, and erratic.

Seemed like he was in constant dilemmas, like drawing impossible splits, but times have changed.

Today's southpaws, though comparatively few in number, are losing their freakish identity. They are commanding the most respect in the annual American Bowling Congress tournament where for the past three years, lefthanders have walked off with three singles championships. Proof enough that portsiders belong in fast company.

GERZINE SNAPS REIGN

Until the 1955 tournament, only one southpaw was able to distinguish himself in the individual event. He was Marshall Levey, of Indianapolis, Indiana, who snared the crown in 1907.

A kegler from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Home of the Braves", Eddie Gerzine snapped the long reign of righties three years ago, in the Fort Wayne tournament, with his winning 738 score.

George Wade, of Steubenville, Ohio, came along in 1956 at Rochester, New York, with a 744, and bespectacle Bob Allen of Yonkers, New York, cast his southpaw magic last spring at Fort Worth, Texas, with a tuneful 729.

Two other lefties figured in the ABC championships of bygone days. Buffalo's Clarence Long in 1925 southpawed his way to a pair of titles. A member of the first place Weisser Blue Ribbons, he also copped all-events honors.

The famed Tea Shops of Milwaukee, holders of the highest team game in tour ament history (1186) owed a major portion of its success in 1937 to lefthander George Marshall.

Wade has easily established himself as the number one lefthander in recent ABC competition. He finished third in all-events in (1946) in 1956 and fourth in all-events (1945) in 1948. The past two tournaments Wade boasts a 212:12 placing him second to Bill Lillard in the two year average column.

He holds a 12 year average of 192. Whether you are left or righthanded, now is the time to enter the 1958 ABC Tournament, opening on March 29th in Syracuse, New York, and running for 72 days through June 8th.

Mail your entry now as soon as possible to ABC Tournament Heaquarters, Onondaga County War Memorial Building, Syracuse, New York. Final deadline to enter is February 11, 1958.

A MAN O FACTION

Frank Esposito, the good-looking and successful owner of the Paramus Bowl, is the tops in his field as he has brought in the top artists to the Lanes since his grand opening in 1955.

These bowlers and many others were signed by Larry Keyser, Ebonite's local demon representative, in the Eastern sector.

The January 15th elimination bout with Turner in Philly will tell story, as a win by Vince will put him on top.


While a setback will put Martinez on the outside with his ever loving manager, Sweet Willum Daly of Englewood.

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


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
