

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






CLIFTON — Registration for Clifton's May municipal election will be held this week, Miss Edith Marrion, city clerk, announced.

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# **EDITORIALS**

#### **OUR PRESENT DANGER**

Communism has produced a vast literature. That literature has now been notably enriched, with J. Edgar Hoover's newly-published "Master of Deceit".


Mr. Hoover's book carries the subtitle "The Story of Communism in America and How to Fight It." No man is more familiar with that story. He was made Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation during the Coolidge Administration, has been retained in office by every President since, and has done an outstanding job in keeping the bureau free of political influence, inefficiency and corruption. And, in recent years, Mr. Hoover and the Bureau have become more and more involved with the Communist conspiracy.

The purpose of "Masters of Deceit" is intensely practical. It is to explain the facts about communism—what it is, how it works, what its aims are, the dangers it poses, and what loyal Americans must do to protect their freedom. Mr. Hoover provides a short account of communism's beginnings, and goes on to explain who American communists are and why they adopt the idealogy. He shows how the party is organized, and deals with its subtle and devious strategy and tactics. Espionage and sabotage—weapons with which trained communists are extraordinarily adept—are given careful attention.

Mr. Hoover is particularly concerned with the danger of discounting the menace of communism in the United States. It is true that Party membership has declined. It reached its peak of 80,000 in 1944, dropped to 22,600 in 1955, and has gone down farther since then. However, no less an authority than William Z. Foster has said: "... we no longer measure the importance of revolutionary organizations by size. In some places where there are only one or two men, more results are obtained than where they have larger organizations  $\ldots$  " If conditions are ripe, a comparative handful can take over a nation—and they have done exactly that time and time again. To quote Mr. Hoover: "Under communism, a tiny minority, perhaps 10 to 20 men, would rule the United States. An open dictatorship called the 'dictatorship of the proletariat' would be established." 'Communist Party henchmen would take over, and opposition would be ruthlessly liquidated.

What can the individual do about the danger? Mr. Hoover's answer is "a lot." He must know the answers to communism's false claims. If what appears to be subversive activity comes to his attention he should report it, sticking to the facts, to the nearest FBI office—and the FBI, incidentally, is as much interested in protecting civil rights, including the right to hold unpopular opinions, as it is in combatting those who would destroy us. He should be alert and informed. No one can fight communism if he doesn't know what to look for. In this connection, "Masters of Deceit" contains a glossary, in which terms frequently used by communists are listed and defined, which will be especially valuable to those whose familiarity with the movement is sketchy.

Finally, "Masters of Deceit" makes for first class reading as well as for first class education against a clear and present danger. It is one of the most important books of our time." Come On Boy, Up And At It!







#### END OF THE ESSEX

"We have been unfortunate, but not disgraced." So Captain David Porter, in a communication to the Secretary of the Navy, spoke of the end of the U. S. frigate Essex on March 28,1814 at Valparaiso, Chile. As master of the Essex, Captain Porter could make that statement with pride. Sailing from Philadelphia in

Salling from Philadelphia in December of 1812, the light fri-gate Essex, 46 guns, headed for the South Atlantic to join Commodore Bainbridge's squadron at Bahia, Brazil. The Essex missed Bainbridge's ships. Captain Por-ter decided to take his ship south-

Around Cape Horn sailed the Essex, the first American warship to do so, and she set out on a raiding cruise against British whaling ships in the Pacific After whaling ships in the Pacific. After replenishing her supplies at Valparaiso, Chile, in March, 1813, the Essex began stalking the British whalers around the Galapagos Islands. The happy hunting went on from April to September with more than half of the enemy whaling fleet captured and millions of dollars loss inflicted.

A fleet of British warships be-A fleet of British warships began to hunt the Essex, and hearing of it, Captain Porter sailed his ship 3,000 miles to the far-off South Sea Islands, little known at that time. Here, among the tropical Marquesas Islands, Porter overhauled his ship. He had the run of the islands and on one of run of the islands, and on one of them he founded Madisonville, them he founded Madisonville, the first American overseas naval

In December the Essex started back on the long voyage home. The first stop was again Valpari-The first stop was again Valpariso. And here in this neutral port the British at last caught up with the Essex. Two ships, H. M. S. Phoebe, 44 guns, and the warsloop Cherub, 26 guns, commanded by Captain J. M. Hillyar.

For days the ships lay in harbor while the rival captains glowered across neutral water and the crews traded shouted insults. Fearing reinforcements for his blockaders, Porter decided to make a dash for the open sea at first opportunity. He saw his chance when a gale blew up, but just outside the harbor the storm suddenly tore away his maintopmast. Captain Porter tried to put his severely damaged ship back into port but the two enemy ships closed in. Now the cannon ships closed in. Now the cannon boomed.

The Essex was boxed in against the shore with the Phoebe off her stern and the Cherub on her bow The battle was terribly bloody and one-sided. The British

bow The battle was terribly bloody and one-sided. The British ships raked the Essex repeatedly while the latter in her partly-crippled condition could hardly bring her guns to bear.

For two hours the Essex resisted stubbornly, but hopelessly, The battle was dreadful. The American ship was almost shot to pieces. After three-quarters of her crew had been killed or wounded, Captain Porter surrendered. The battle had been one of the worst slaughters of the War of 1812. One American survivor was a 12-year-old midshipman, Davy Farragut, captured with his pet pig "Murphy" Vividly he recalled the slaughter. "I was standing near the captain, said the boy who was to become a great naval hero years later. "when a shot came aboard, killing four men and scattering the brains of one over both of us."




ous cruises in naval history, the end of the Essex was, indeed, un-fortunate. But as her captain well reported, her end was certainly not disgraceful.

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
