



In 1834, according to the minutes, there was one meeting a year for election of officials. Manufacturers who employed 50 people were tax free for ten years.

Roads were a problem in those days. Road workers were paid a dollar a day until September and 50 cents during the winter and they were allowed to work out their road tax this way.


#### Paint Labeling Bill Is Introduced in Trenton

#### **New Unifac Computer For Turnpike**

The New Jersey Turnpike, whose 131 miles of wide, divided highways constitute the nation's most heavily travelled toll road, will be the world's first turnpike to install the new Univac Computer, the first solid-state data processing system in actual commercial operation. This was announced today by Joseph Morecraft, Jr., the Turnpike Authority's chairman.

A contract has been signed with the Remington Rand Division of the Sperry Rand Corporation for delivery of the computer this summer.

The new computer will be housed in the computing center at the turnpike's headquarters in New Brunswick. It will replace a Univac 60 system.

"Since the completion of the turnpike in 1952, vehicular traffic has been increasing by the millions yearly," the chairman said. "There were 41,615,115 cars, buses and trucks traveling the turnpike last year. The paper work involved in processing this many toll cards was staggering — particularly when you realize that there were 3,528 possible rate combinations.

The new computer, which is capable of making over 10,000 additions or subtractions per second and which has a "memory" storage of 50,000 characters or information, can be used for many other purposes including cost distribution and personnel records.

#### Social Security Report Due April 15

People who work for themselves in a business, trade or profession are reminded by Stanley J. Fioresi, district manager of the Paterson social security office to report their earnings for social security purposes with their income tax returns.

For most business people this return is due on or before April 15, 1959, and the social security tax rate for 1958 is 3% per cent of the first \$4,200 of net earnings.

Since Federal income tax returns are used not only for reporting the amount of income for income tax purposes but also for reporting self-employment income for social security credits, it is necessary that a complete and accurate Schedule C. be filed with the income tax Form 1040. If net income from a trade or business was \$400 or more, social security taxes must be paid on these net earnings. This is compulsory even though no income tax is due. Self-employed persons sometimes overlook their responsibilities for paying social security taxes because they have enough exemptions so that they don't owe any income tax.

Mr. Fioresi concluded with the reminder that maintaining complete and accurate records is good business from many standpoints, and these records are particularly valuable when income tax time rolls around. In preparing the business Schedule C, it is important that only operating profit from the business be included in income and that all allowable expenses be listed. So, a complete and accurate income tax return filed on or before April 15 will serve a dual purpose — it will satisfy the Internal Revenue filing requirement and will guarantee proper earnings credits to your social security account. 



# **EDITORIALS**

#### A NEW AGE

Not long ago an airliner soared off a runway at New York's Idlewild Airport bound for Europe. There's nothing unusual in international flying these days but this particular event was historic in the fullest sense of the word. For the flight, operated by Pan American World Airways, marked the beginning the jet age of commercial air transport on a world-wide scale.

The jets have manifold advantages over the piston planes—in speed, comfort, carrying capacity. And back of the jet age is a story of risk and enterprise.

The jets are far more costly than the largest and most advanced pistion-engined planes. Pan America's initial order, placed in 1955, involves an expenditure of a cool \$300 million and the line has placed additional orders since. According to a Christian Science Monitor account: "The total planned investment by all lines in jets will add up to a whopping \$3 billion." Additional huge sums must be spent for other facilities made necessary by the jets.

It could logically be assumed that these stupifying costs must be offset by heavy increases in fares. But that isn't the case. Fares are being held to their past levels, and the hope is that substantial reductions can be made in the future. This policy is based on the expectation that the number of people traveling the international airways will steadily rise, and that the jets, with their 150-passenger capacities, will operate under full-load conditions. Any such anticipation is in the nature of a gamble—but it's in the American tradition of enterprise to take such gambles.

Finally, there's more to the jet age than just a swifter and more comfortable way of going abroad. As Juan T. Trippe, president of Pan American sees it, the jets will make a real contribution to world peace, by making possible a better, and broader understanding between peoples. There's nothing this torn world needs more.

#### THE "REALLY HARD SELL"


Much criticism is heard of the advertising methods used on television in this country. The sponsors, footing the big bills for the programs, commonly pursue what is known in advertising circles as "the hard sell."

But the "really hard sell", writes Mike Wallace in The New York Times Magazine, is found in Russia, where TV, like everything else, is a government monopoly and an instrument of government policy. Mr. Wallace recently visited Moscow, and examined the situation there. He says: "... of all the entertainment media in the Soviet Union, television is the least rewarding to the spectator and the most persistently propaganda-filled. As a matter of fact, Russian television is the most commercial in the world. Incessantly, it sells one product—the Soviet system."

Well, that should surprise no one. In any dictatorship, every possible means is used to sell the system, and TV is peculiarly well adapted to this kind of propaganda. It is excellent for brainwashing. The dictators can order said and implied whatever they like, and no matter how big the lie the people have no means of learning the truth. And if the big lie is given sufficient forceful repetition, as Hitler knew, it becomes truth to the millions.

In short, total government has to do more than dominate all the physical aspects of a nation. It has to dominate the minds of the people.

# The Editor Speaks

Mind you, I never claimed to be an authority on anything. So I may be all wrong about what Iam going to say now.

But I DO believe that there is altogether too much publicity and altogether too much scare-talk about disease and accidents.

It is perfectly all right to enlighten people and tell them that they should go to their doctors for regular checkups.

People should be warned to drive slowly and carefully. That is common sense.

The other night, over the radio, a fellow shouted at me in a funnereal voice (Note to typesetter: Please leave the two n's in "funnereal". It sounded as if I came out of a funnel.): "You may never come back alive from the automobile trip on which you start tomorrow." He repeated and repeated it.

It just so happened that we WERE going to start out on a trip the following morning. My wife was going to drive.

But she was so nervous when next morning came around that  ${\bf I}$  had to do the driving. And that made her even more nervous.

The power of suggestion can be dangerous. The fear of cancer, in my humble opinion, might cause a serious neurosis. Being afraid of heart trouble is apt to bring it on. Now there is a big drive on about the affect of smoking on cancer. So they send out rafts of publicity about the research — and scare millions of people half to death.

I think I have told you this before, but it does no harm to repeat it. I asked a famous heart specialist whether smoking was harmful to me 25 years ago. The reply was: "I don't know whether smoking is harmful. But I do know that if you WANT to smoke and CAN'T—that IS harmful. It's the resistance in you that causes the harm.

"Personally I think that nothing you do in moderation can hurt you very much."

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority is seeking bids from contracting firms to install additional roadway lighting facilities in the median and on the toll plaza, as well as other incidental work, at the Newark Airport Interchange in Newark. Fish Mysteries Of Ocean Being Solved

Mysteries of the deep Atlantic off the New Jersey coast are being solved by fisheries biologists of the State Division of Fish and Game and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

A two week cruise was completed recently with scientists aboard the research vessel Albatross III. The purpose of the cruise was to study the distribution of fish under winter conditions in the Middle Atlantic Bight—the area between Martha's Vineyard and Cape Hatteras.


A great deal of information was obtained on porgies. It is now believed that there are two races of porgies off the New Jersey coast.







#### This Week In AMERICAN HISTOR

FALL OF THE ALAMO

For twelve days the cannon of the Mexican army commanded by General Santa Anna had been hammering the wall of the Alamo hammering the wall of the Alamo in San Antonio, Texas, where a group of Americans, including a garrison of 187 fighting men, was besiged. Now, at daybreak of the morning of March 6, 1836, the Mexican lines began closing in for the final assault.

Santa Anna had brought his army of several thousand troops up from Mexico to defeat the Americans fighting for Texan in-

army of several rhousand troops up from Mexico to defeat the Americans fighting for Texan independence. The small force of Americans defending the town of San Antonio took up its position in the Alamo. Originally a Spanish mission containing a chapel, a convent and a barracks, with a plaza of about two acres enclosed by an eight foot high stone wall, it was now being used as a fort. The Mexican army had surrounded the Alamo so that there would be no escape for its garrison. Their cannon pounded the stone wall day after day. After hundreds of Mexicans were killed in trying to size the fort, a breach was made in the wall by the cannon-fire. On the thirteenth day of the siege the final assault bearsn. Both sides know the this

day of the siege the final assault began. Both sides knew that this battle would be a fight to the fin-ish Santa Anna had hoisted a blood-red flag which meant "No prisoners!"

The 187 American defenders were very tired from continuous fighting and loss of sleep. But they were rugged men of the frontier type, commanded by such tough leaders as Colonels William Travis, James Bowie, and Davy Crockett. They relied once Davy Crockett They rallied once more on the wall to repel the Mexican advance with deadly rifle fire.

The Mexicans came on with The Mexicans came on with scaling ladders to climb over the wall. Swarming up by the hundreds they were heedless of their losses inflicted by the sharpshooting defenders. Their first assault was thrown back. A second as-

sault was also pushed back. Santa Anna was out to take the Alamo at all costs. He ordered a third assault that converged on a point where the wall had been broken

where the wall had been broken by cannon-fire.

Through this opening poured the Mexican soldiers, brave men also, across the bodies of their first fallen ranks, while the hot rifles of the defenders never stopped firing. Colonel Travis, commander of the garrison, went down fighting on the wall. Now the defenders were pushed back by the Mexicans swarming through the breach and over the the defenders were pushed back by the Mexicans swarming through the breach and over the wall Splitting up, the outnum-bered defenders took their last stand in the tumbled ruins in the yard. in the buildings, in the chapel. Singly and in tight little groups they fought from house to house, room to room, swinging clubbed rifles and knives when their bullets gave out.

their bullets gave out.

Jim Bowie, inventor of the wicked Bowie knife, was laid up in bed from a previous injury. He kept firing his pistol and swinging his big knife until the Mexican bayonets finished him. In the chapel, the last point to fall, Davy Crockett and the dozen volunteers who had come with him from Tennessee. fought to the last

man.

By eight o'clock in the morning it was all over. Not one of the 187 brave defenders was left alive The brutal message of Santa Anna's blood-red flag was car-ried out to the finish.

ried out to the finish.

But Santa Anna's bloody victory here was to cost him dearly very soon. The slaughter of the Alamo's garrison filled the fighters for Texan independence with fierce hatred and roused their fighting spirit to the highest pitch. Less than two months after the fall of the Alamo the Texans crushed Santa Anna's army ans crushed Santa Anna's army at the battle of San Jacinto. Their victorious war cry was, "Remem-ber the Alamo!"
