

## Congressman Canfield To Retire In January

Congressman Gordon Canfield has announced his plans to retire at the end of his eleventh term on January 2, 1960.

Dean of the New Jersey Congressional delegation and veteran of 19 Congressional campaigns Canfield listed health as his reason for winding up his career.

In 1958 he underwent surgery and plunged into a bitter election campaign without taking adequate time to recover. This past summer his health broke under strain of a heavy legislative load and he was advised by his physicians to take a leave of absence. He recently resumed his Congressional duties.

In a statement announcing his retirement plans Canfield said:

"While rapidly recovering from my recent illness I must conserve my health. I will seek some association with private enterprise in the months ahead.

"I have been thrilled to represent in the world's largest free legislature one of our country's finest constituencies," he said.

Canfield also commended his loyal staff headed by Walter P. Kennedy and expressed gratitude to Passaic County Republican leader Lloyd B. Marsh, his party and all of his friends and supporters.

"I shall continue to be an active party worker in the cause of good government," he concluded.

Canfield was elected to his first term in 1940, succeeding Congressman George H. Seger, whom he served as secretary for 17 years.





## U. S. Making Progress In Space Program

Despite the failure of the recent attempt to put a satellite into a moon orbit, U. S. space officials see substantial successes ahead. Definitely planned for 1960 are launchings of satellites to study the sun and the earth's outer atmosphere. If the current schedule of progress in rocketry can be maintained, the U. S. may shoot for Mars next fall. As early as next spring, the U. S. Mercury space capsule may be ready for experimental manned flights.

### DeMille Autobiography Interesting Reading

The most productive, durable and controversial of Hollywood pioneers, Cecil B. DeMille, whose motion pictures have been seen by four billion people, wrote most of his life story before he died in 1959. Donald Hayne, his longtime associate, completed the autobiography. which was published recently.

Last year when he was queried about the manuscript, which was five years overdue, DeMille remarked he seemed to be too busy living his life to finish writing it. At 77 he was actively engaged in planning future projects of enormous scope. Hayne sorted through 36 files of letters, memoranda and other papers to finish the book.

The photographs in the book are from the author's private collection portraying his youth, family and career. DeMille arranged some years ago that all royalties from the book go to a trust fund for charitable, religious and educational work.

DeMille was more than a filmmaker. He also founded the nation's first regularly scheduled freight and passenger airline; as a vice president of the Bank of America he instituted the present pattern of loans for film production; he valued the honor but rejected the nomination for Senator; he left his job as producer of Theatre which radio's Lux brought him \$98,000 a year, because he would not pay a onedollar political assessment levied by his union. He was a deeply religious man who never travelled without his well-worn Bible, and who took no financial profit from two of his films with religious themes, "The King of Kings" and "The Ten Commandments."

DeMille has always been a controversial figure, and film critics do not agree on the dramatic merits of his films.

He has been called a flamboyant showman, while others rated him "a screen statesman." He has been accused of looking on the Bible as a limitless story source for his "extravaganzas," while another point of view was put into words by Evangelist Billy Graham, who termed DeMille "a prophet in celluloid."

Scandal did not touch DeMille. He left behind his wife of more than fifty-six years in the home where they had lived for forty-three of the forty-six years they were in Hollywood.

He was born in Ashfield, Mass., August 12, 1881. His family settled in New Amsterdam in 1658.



## 76ts Week In AMERICAN HISTORY

BATTLE OF TRENTON

Christmas Day of 1776, and in Trenton, New Jersey, by the ice-choked Delaware River, the Hessians were making merry in their comfortable quarters. They were a part of the German troops hired by the British to fight the American patriots. Across the riv-er, on the Pennsylvania side, Washington's ragged soldiers huddled in their camp.

It seemed as if this bitter winter might see the end of the patriot cause. Washington's army
had fled across New Jersey before the stronger British forces.
Soldiers had gone back to their
homes by the hundreds. The rest
of the shrinking American army,
poorly equipped, unpaid, and often hungry, was held together
mostly by the forcefulness of its
great leader. A week before
Christmas Washington wrote to a
relative, "If every nerve is not
strained to recruit the new army
with all possible expedition, I
think that the game is pretty
near up."

Though the situation was bad, Though the situation was bad, Washington decided on a bold stroke with the troops that he had. There was one hope left he decided — attack! He would cross the Delaware by night and attack the Hessians at Trenton on the morning of the day after Christness before their merrymaking

morning of the day after Christmas before their merrymaking mood wore off. "It is necessity, dire necessity," Washington said. While the Hessians were having a grand time the freezing Americans prepared to cross the icy river. At twilight of that cold Christmas night the little army of 2400 men in boats began its struggle with the ice floes and the rapid current. Washington had hoped to be across the river by midnight, but with the load of cannon and baggage it was past three o'clock in the morning be three o'clock in the morning be-fore all the troops had crossed

Snow was falling. The night was very black and cold. At four o'clock it seemed too late to march on Trenton with hope of a surprise. Yet it was too late to turn back. Forward, then! The shivering troops began the nine mile march to Trenton.

They suffered severly as they marched down the river road. The snow had turned to freezing sleet and on the sharp slippery ice red stains showed where brave men marched with broken shoes. It was eight o'clock in the morning when the American advance began driving in the Hessian pic-kets. The enemy was unprepared. Colonel Rall, the Hessian com-mander, jumped out of bed to rally his men. He soon fell mortally wounded.


The battle was sharp and over in less than an hour. Over one hundred Hessians were killed and wounded, while almost a thousand with all their equipment, were captured. The American loss was two killed, a few dozen wounded, and two frozen to death on the march. That night Washington and his army were back in their camp across the Delaware with their prisoners and booty.

The victory at Trenton shat-tered British hopes for a quick end to the Revolution. The colonies rejoiced and took new courage for the struggle for liberty.

In Philadelphia the captured Hessians were marched through the streets so the people could see the proof of the American triumph. The patriots thanked God for the victory won by Washington's little army. Muhlenberg, the Lutheran patriarch, exclaimed "The Lord of Hosts has heard the cry of the distressed, and sent his angel to their assistance!" angel to their assistance!
