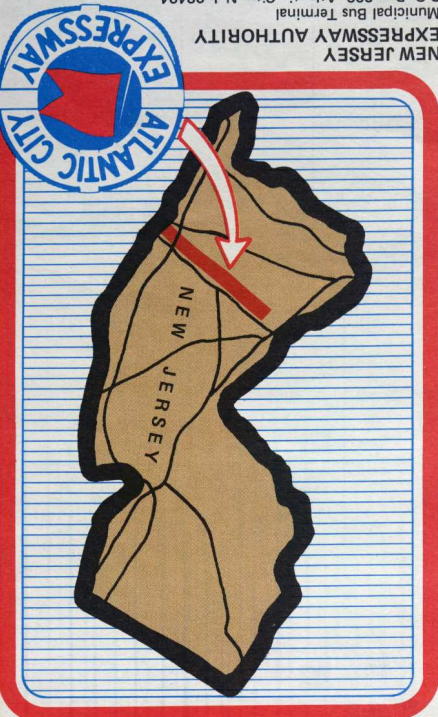


ATLANTIC CITY EXPRESSWAY ROUTE MAP

PREPAID COUPONS

Are available for use by any vehicle at the Pleasantville and the Egg Harbor Plazas also May's Landing, when manually operated, during Racing Seasons.

EXPRESSWAY DRIVING HINTS

1. Keep to the right except to pass. Stay a safe distance behind the vehicle in front of you . . . at least 150 feet or one delivery back.
2. Maintain your speed. Stay a safe distance behind the vehicle in front of you. Be sure that the vehicle ahead is not going to pass the one in front of it. Move into the passing lane well back and do not return to the right lane until you can plainly see the vehicle you have passed in your mirror.
3. Watch for interchange signs. If you miss an exit, drive to the next. Do not back up!
4. Stopping on pavement is prohibited. Emergency stops are permitted only on the right hand road shoulder.
5. Stopping of vehicle on any part of the Expressway for the purpose of picking up or discharging any person is prohibited. Hitch-hikers and other pedestrians are barred.
6. Make sure your vehicle is in sound mechanical condition.
7. Check your tires. Don't run out of gas.
8. The Service Area, located at the midpoint of the Expressway, provides food and fuel. If fatigued, take a break.

SERVICE CHARGES

Nearby garages have been authorized to provide reasonable rates, on the clock towing and other services. You will be charged a service charge of \$5. plus the cost of gasoline, oil, labor, parts, tires, and other materials needed to repair your car. A schedule of towing charges has been fixed by the Expressway and is printed on the reverse side of the Service Invoice. All charges pay on any other road in the same area.

EMERGENCY SERVICE

If your vehicle becomes disabled along the Expressway, pull off of the paved roadway onto the shoulder on the right. If you wish to make your own repairs, you may do so, but stay located at approximately one mile interval along the right (directional) roadway.

TO SUMMON AID

EMERGENCY SIGNAL CALL BOXES which you may use to summon aid or service. Follow the instructions posted at these locations, press the correct signal button, return to your vehicle and wait for the State Police Patrol. Keep off the paved roadway while going to or from a Call Box.



If for any reason you cannot signal from an Emergency Signal Call Box, wait in your vehicle for a State Police Patrol. The State Police patrol the Expressway around the clock. Do not flag down a passing vehicle. It is dangerous for them (and for you) to stop. However, you may alert a passing motorist to your need for help by being a white handkerchief to the left hand door handle. Passing motorists are asked to report such signal at the next toll plaza to expedite aid.

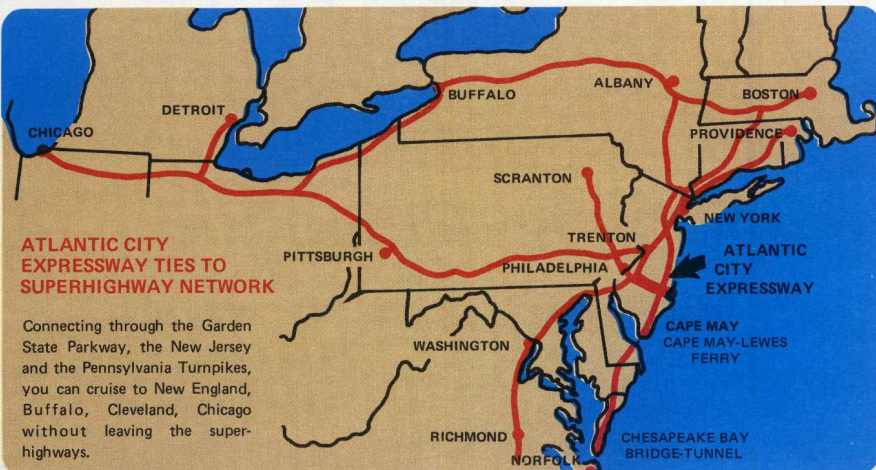
TOLLS

COMMERCIAL VEHICLES AND TRAILERS

(Buses, two axle motor vehicle with dual tires on rear wheels, a motor vehicle with 3 or more axles, a motor vehicle and trailer with total of 3 or more axles.)

Truck rates apply to passenger cars towing boat trailers, campers or utility trailers. (Example: - car plus one axle trailer classed as a three-axle truck, car plus two or more axle trailer classed as a four axle truck.)



HISTORIC SHRINE, MUSEUMS AND POINTS OF INTEREST

1. Liberty Bell - Independence Square - Philadelphia, Pa.
2. New Jersey Liberty Bell - Bridgeton (rung on signing of Declaration of Independence)
3. Chestnut Neck Monument 1778 - commemorates the British attack on the villages of privateers who practiced piracy on the high seas. The village and ten vessels were destroyed.
4. Hancock House - Hancock's Bridge, Salem - Open Daily, Scene of Patriot Massacre 1778.
5. Greenwich Tea Party. In honor of the patriots (disguised as Indians) of Cumberland County, N.J. who on evening of December 22, 1774 burned British Tea near this site. Teas taken from Capt. Allen's Brig Grayhound. This monument erected in 1908.
6. Walt Whitman House - 330 Mickle Street, Camden (Poet's Home) Open Daily through year.
7. Batsto - In Wharton Forest. Restored Manor House. Early iron working Community. Open Daily - Memorial Day through Labor Day - weekends in May and from Labor Day through October.
8. Red Bank Battlefield - scene of Battle 1777.
9. Monument - Battle of Trenton 1776.
10. Absecon Lighthouse, Pacific and Rhode Island Aves., Atlantic City.
11. Barnegat Lighthouse Park - Long Beach Island, Barnegat
12. Cape May Court House Historical Museum.
13. Friends Meeting House - 1716 (Seaville)
14. Somers Mansion - Somers Point.
15. Smithville Inn Old Village.
16. Bass River State Forest.
17. Pleasant Mills.
18. Carranza Memorial.
19. Mt. Holly - Quakers 1676.
20. Wheaton Village.
