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**MR. EDISON'S SYSTEM OF COPYRIGHTING MOVING PICTURE FILMS
SUSTAINED BY THE COURT OF APPEALS.**

"The instantaneous and continuous operation of the camera is such that the difference between successive pictures is not distinguishable by the eye and is so slight that the casual observer will take a very considerable number of pictures of the series and say they are identical. It is only when pictures far removed from each other in the series are compared that differences are seen, but in every one the platform from which the christening took place, and on which prominent persons attending the launch sit, is deleted. To require each of numerous undistinguishable pictures to be individually copyrighted, as suggested by the court below, would in effect be to require copyright of many pictures to protect a single one. So much for the negative.

"When we consider the positive, sheet which was copyrighted, we have a stronger case. What was thus copyrighted was a single cell-oid sheet on which a number of objects had been photographically printed or reproduced. These objects were there portrayed by light action or photography as unguessed. No matter how the negative was obtained, whether by numerous and successive exposures, is not here material. The statute provides for copyrighting negatives, but the present issue is not whether the negative in question was one covered by the statute, but whether, when the negative as a whole was photographically reproduced, the reproduction was a photograph. At that point we feel assured. When the reproduction was made a positive, a cell-oid negative simply possessed the reproductive capacity by being superimposed to the photographic art. The image obtained by being superimposed on the original and passed through a transparent positive, and the resulting reproductive process produced the positive as light action on a transparent negative. The mere circumstance, that a positive is obtained on a strip of cell-oid and not on a strip of paper, is not material."

It must have recognized there would be a change and advance in making photographs just as there has been in making books, printing chromos, and other subjects of copyright protection. While a photograph is a different type of photograph, yet it is none the less a photograph—a picture produced by photographic process. From the standpoint of preparatory work in securing the negative the latter consists of a number of different views, but when the negative was secured the article reproduced therefrom was a single photograph of the whole. And that it is in substance a single photograph is shown by the fact that its value consists in its protection as a whole or unit, and the injury to copyright protection consists not in pirating one picture, but in appropriating it in its entirety.

"We are further of opinion the photograph in question met the statutory requirement of being intended to be perfected and completed as a work of fine art. It embodies artistic conception and expression. To obtain it requires a study of lights, shadows, general surroundings, and a vantage point adapted to securing the entire effect. In *Bolles vs. The Outing Company*, 77 Fed. Rep. 969, depicting a yacht under full sail was held to constitute an original work of art; and in view of the recent decision of the Supreme Court, *Bleistein vs. Donaldson Company*, 102 U. S. 1553, in reference to the character in that regard of a circus poster, we have no question that the present photograph sufficiently fulfills the character of a work of the fine arts. We are also of opinion the shoe was duly marked, for it was such as 'to give notice of the copyright to the public by placing upon each copy in some visible shape the name of the author, the existence of the claim to exclusive right, and the date at which this right was obtained,' which in *Burrow Giles Co. vs. Sarony*, 111 U. S. 755, was said to be the object of the statute."

YACHT RACE FILMS.

SIR THOMAS LIPTON'S YACHT FLEET LEAVING ENGLAND.

A very complete and comprehensive picture showing Sir Thomas Lipton's fleet, including *Shamrock III* and *I*, the steam yacht "*Erin*" and the ocean tug "*Cruzier*," leaving *Gourock*, Scotland, at the beginning of their long ocean voyage to America. An interesting portion of this film is the scene in which genial Sir Thomas is seen bidding good-bye to his faithful officers and crew who are gathered on the after-deck of the Cup challenger *Shamrock III*. After the farewell address, Sir Thomas leaves the yacht. As he boards the launch, which conveys him ashore, the sailors are seen giving three hearty cheers. An excellent view is then shown of the two yachts passing by in jury rig, *Shamrock III* being towed by *Erin* and *Shamrock I* by the tug "*Cruzier*."

A ROMANCE OF THE RAIL.

[This subject was taken on the lines of the Lackawanna Railroad, and for its successful accomplishment we are indebted to the officials of that road for facilities generously furnished while making the picture.]

A series of railroad scenes of novel and amusing interest. It opens with a view of an imposing station showing a pretty girl, dressed in white, seated on a trunk awaiting the arrival of her train.

A young man approaches, also dressed in white, and the two immediately fall in love. The Lackawanna Limited then rolls into the station and the Pullman porter helps the couple aboard.

As the Limited pulls out the pair are seen on the observation platform waving adieu to their friends. The picture later shows the train rushing sixty miles an hour through the famous Delaware Water Gap in the Blue Ridge Mountains, with the young couple enjoying the passing scenery. As Delaware Water Gap station is reached a porter appears with his brush, but the young people protest that the journey has been so free from dust that there is no need for his services.

The climax comes when the young man, who has become more and more infatuated, secures a minister and the marriage ceremony takes place on the rear platform. The picture shows them leaving the train on arrival at the Gap, and a little humor is added at the end by the appearance of two tramps from beneath the trucks of the observation car dressed in full evening clothes, who become indignant at the offer of the porter to brush them off, as their trip has been entirely free from soot and dust.

The series is full of snappy train scenes and is certain to provoke a laugh.

SHOOTING THE RAPIDS AT LUNA PARK.

AFRICANDER WINNING THE SUBURBAN HANDICAP, 1903.

The Coney Island Jockey Club's Suburban Handicap race was won by the three-year-old bay colt Africander, with the best and most seasoned horses in training at his heels. He took the lead in the stretch, and for the final quarter of a mile flew down the track at a pace that astonished the crowd. Africander won from Herbert by a head. Hunter Raine was third. None who witnessed the race will soon forget the finish. After the race, the camera is revolved to the left, bringing into view the rider of Africander, seated in floral chain, and the cheering multitudes in the grand stand.

NEW YORK CITY POLICE PARADE.

The policemen are first shown pushing back the crowds that gathered in front of the City Hall, New York City, to witness the Mayor presenting medals to brave bluecoats. Next is shown the presentation of the medals. The parade is then

shown. First come the policemen on foot, then the Harbor Police, and the Police band, followed by the Mounted Police.

When the Patrol comes up near them, it lowers a dory and a number of policemen make the capture. As the pirates are landed on the Police Boat a fierce fight takes place between them and the police, but the latter overcome the offenders and land them safely on the boat.

Taken at a stag-hunt. Shows the hounds rushing through a hedge, with the huntsmen following. Each horse comes on with a rush and clears the hedge with the exception of one. This one goes to his knees, throwing the rider heavily to the ground. Fortunately, neither horse nor rider is hurt. A fine picture of one of the greatest of sports.

COUNTY FAIR.

An old time county fair with its merry-go-rounds and swings filled with young folks, the latter having a splendid time. Very realistic.

A pretty scene. Numerous trout are seen jumping high out of the water at feeding time. Pretty water effects as the fish splash about.

PULLING AGAINST THE STREAM.

The camera is placed in the rear of the boat and focused on two men at the oars. As they pull against the current, the facial expressions and exertions of the oarsmen are very realistic.

DAYLIGHT BURGLARY.

A burglar jumps a back fence and enters the rear of a house, by prying open one of the windows. It is evident that the people of the house discovered the thief and called the police, for shortly after the robber enters the window, two policemen come along on a run and enter the place after him. Scene now changes to the roof. The burglar tries to escape, but is caught by one of the officers, and a fight ensues in which the officer gets the worst of it, and is thrown to the ground. The burglar escapes to the street through another house, closely followed by the second policeman. When the latter reaches the street and sees his comrade almost dead, he calls for the ambulance. This is seen rushing to the scene. The injured man is placed on a stretcher, carried to the ambulance, and then taken to the hospital. Calling for reinforcements, the second policeman continues to run after the thief. He chases him through the fields, over streams, etc. The thief finally reaches the railroad station just as a train is pulling out. He jumps on the train, and leaves the officers, who were close behind. The telegraph service is here brought into use, and when the train stops at the next station, a squad of police are there to meet it. The burglar alights and makes a break for liberty, but is soon caught and handcuffed, after a struggle. He is then taken to the lock-up to await trial. Exciting from start to finish.

LEHIGH VALLEY BLACK DIAMOND EXPRESS.

As it draws near, the engine whistle warns some section hands who are working in the foreground. Just as she passes from view another train dashes by, going in the opposite direction.
