S001. Battle of San Juan Hill.....Arron

One of the greatest war films ever placed upon the market. The enemy is seen crouching in the underbrush at the foot of a steep hill. Suddenly our own soldier boys appear under the order of "forward by rushes" and gradually charge up the hill. The most realistic part of the subject is the explosion of bombs thrown by the enemy.
