1654 The Arrival of President Roosevelt and Ex-President Cleveland. (Code Velt.)

This picture shows the carriage containing President Roosevell, Ex-Ptes. Cleveland and Ex-Gov. Francis, Pres. of the St. Louis Exposition, arriving at the exposition grounds, followed by the carriages of the foreign

1656 President Roosevelt at Portland. The complete film. (Code Acritan.) Nowhere on his western trip was President Roosevelt received with greater enthusiasm than at Portland. The parade was unique; large number of school-children were dressed to represent the American flag, and as they
marched along they presented a pretty appearance. Whilst there the greatest moving picture ever made of the President was taken during a rain storm. The President was there to preside at the ceremonies pertaining to the laying of the comer stone of the Lewis and Clark monument in Portland's picturesque city park. Just as the President began his speech rain came down in torrents. A rubber blanket was thrown around the President's shoulders and he talked for thirty minutes through the pelting rain. In addition to getting all the incidents of the President's speech the taking camera swept over the vast umbrella covered assembly with the result that it is the most unique moving picture ever made. The film is clear and bright as a bell.
