Capatola proves to be more than a match for the rascal, and by a clever ruse captures the robber. He, after a few months in jail, repents of his sins and sends the brave girl a confession of his share in the capture and detention of her mother whom Le Noir keeps concealed in the hidden house. This house has gained the reputation of being haunted through the frequent appearances of a woman dressed in white who frantically appeals to the occasional passers by, by waving a gloved hand. In supplication, a ruse of Le Noir's, who releases her only at hight, well knows that her appearance will frighten the neighbors and start the rumor that the house is haunted.

Capitola, now in possession of the secret of The Hidden Hand, through Donald's confession, finding that the prisoner is her own Mother, mounts her pony and with a faithful servant to accompany her, dashes to the rescue.
