EARTHQUAKE PICTURES AT KEITH'S.

A notable feature of the vaudeville show last night was the presentation of admirable life motion pictures showing the awful devastation wrought by earthquake and fire at San Francisco.

The views were the first life motion pictures of the scenes of devastation following the great earthquake at San Francisco. The securing of these enduring records of a catastrophe that will live long in history is due to the energy and enterprise of a Philadelphian.

They show a chaos of brick and granite heaps tangled wires and smoldering timbers in the place where stately buildings and palatial residences stood a few days before. Soldiers pat of the rained thoroughfares; homeless refugees of all nations of life wander about abjectly in search of food, water and shelter; automobiles bearing dead and wounded, and supply wagons hurrying stores to relief stations fight their way through the disorganized crowds.

S. Lubin, inventor of the cinematograph, deserves credit for the exhibition, for within two hours of the receipt of the news of the great catastrophe, he had a corps of operators en route to the stricken city. The pictures that were obtained are more overwhelming than any written description of the holocaust could be. All the principal public structures and prominent hotels that were shattered by the earthquake and partially consumed by fire are shown. Probably the most realistic picture is a series depicting scenes in the city parks, where the refugees, rich and poor, are camping out in tents and improvised shelters. Men and women of wealth, in grotesque garbs, mingle freely with less fortunate fellow-sufferers, scantily clothed. Meals are being cooked in the open by those who were fortunate enough to procure food and cooking utensils.

ONE OF THE FIRST TO BE SEEN OF THE CALIFORNIA EARTHQUAKE AND FIRE.

One of the first life motion pictures of scenes of devastation following the great earthquake at San Francisco reached this city on Sunday. An all-day and night hustle in printing and developing these marvelous reproductions of the havoc wrought by nature's cataclysm made it possible to exhibit them yesterday afternoon at Keith's Chestnut Street Theatre. The securing of these enduring records of a catastrophe that will live long in history is due to the energy and enterprise of a Philadelphian. He is Professor S. Lubin, the inventor of the cinematograph, which represents the perfection of the motion picture machines. Within two hours after the news of the earthquake was received here, Professor Lubin had dispatched a corps of cinematograph operators to San Francisco.
