IT MAY NOT BE NEWS, but it will put all rumors to the contrary at rest once and for all . . . you can look for Mayor Bernard L. Stafford to announce himself as a candidate for reelection within the next few weeks . . . the "We Want Stafford Reelected" boom started by practically every worker in every ward of the city proves how united the party is from big-wig to small-fry behind the Mayor's chairmanship of the Democratic party and his administration as the city's chief executive.

THERE IS NO DENYING that Stafford's record in office has been one which has benefited the city at large and has won him strong support in the ranks of both business and labor . . . his progressive leadership has given the office of mayor much vigor and dignity during the time he has been in office.

IN THIS CONNECTION, IT is interesting to note one aspect of the speculation surrounding the Republican party's strategy in the mayoralty race . . . city hall circles say that Lloyd Marsh, county G.O.P. leader, is not very anxious to enter a strong candidate against Stafford in the election . . . he is said to feel that if such a candidate were to be elected, he would constitute a strong threat to the party's leadership, since he would have at his command the distribution of more patronage than the county set-up offers Mr. Marsh.

EYEING THE DEMOCRATIC nomination for freeholder these days is Alderman Charles Pirolo who has expressed such desires in conversations with his intimates . . . Charlie feels that should one of the nominations be given to a representative of the Italian-American community, as it was last Fall, his service in behalf of the party merits him the nod.

THERE IS NO QUESTION that Pirolo commands a large popular following . . . added to his record of constructive activity for the Democratic party, which includes service on the county board of taxation for two terms (he was appointed by Governors Edward and Silzer), is the yeoman work he did in the campaign of 1924 when he ran for sheriff during the lean period of the Democratic party's existence . . . tireless and sincere effort which he continues to expend in the party's behalf to this very day.

AND WE'LL CLOSE THIS column with the following query—where do the "hard-pressed" members of the Taxpayers' League get the money to pay auditors' bills for checking city accounts and affairs?

The Sovereign Silk company of this city this week filed an application with Federal Judge Guy L. Fake for reorganization under the provisions of Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy laws. It was referred to Referee in Bankruptcy John Grimshaw.

The Paterson firm listed assets of \$260,344.43 against liabilities of \$46,275.73 in its petition. Founded in 1903, the company was incorporated in 1930.

Problem Publicized By Gavin To Receive Thorough Airing At Session

The county's juvenile delinquents' housing problem, brought to public attention from time to time by Sheriff John A. Gavin, will be given a thorough airing at a meeting set by the board of freeholders this week for May 18.

The board decided to call a special meeting of its miscellaneous committee to consider suggestions for remedying the present set-up of haphazard housing of juvenile delinquents while awaiting disposition of their cases. In some instances, juvenile delinquents have been quartered in the unsavory atmosphere of the county jail, a practice which has been vigorously criticized by Sheriff Gavin.

Westerhoff Speaks

The latest suggestion to reach the board came this week from Chief Probation Officer Garret P. Westerhoff.

"I don't think we need a detention home," Westerhoff told the board. "But I do think we need a juvenile welfare home, or at least a room or two in which to house these juveniles until their cases have been disposed of."

To Consider Plan

For the purpose of considering this, and other suggestions, the board ordered the May 18th meeting.

The bill, drawn up by State Senator Foran of Hunterdon county, and known as Senate Bill No. 52, prohibits "anyone from soliciting funds from persons outside of the State for any police, sheriff, court officers, detectives, constables or justice of the peace organization."

It comes as a remedy to a complaint by businessmen in New York and Philadelphia whose trucks travel through New Jersey that they are being preyed upon by police organizations.

Hits Petty Graft

Gourley, who is chief officer of the most powerful police organization in the state, came out flatly in favor of the bill and asked for its passage on the grounds that "it would eliminate petty graft and help local police departments to carry on their work of law enforcement."

He also called attention to another "petty racket" and asked public support for the enactment of legislation which would prohibit any judge or public official from employing professional canvassers to solicit funds for any pet charity with which the judge may be connected. Hardly five per cent of the money collected is usually spent on the object of the campaign, Gourley declared.

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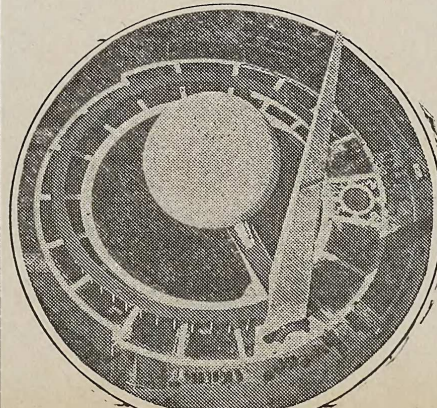

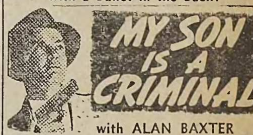
