WELL, THE DIE HAS BEEN cast and former Mayor John V. Hinchliffe will not be the Democratic candidate for sheriff in the Fall . . . yet, sources close to him report that he was quite pleased with the proposition put forth to him by the executive committee of the Democratic party, but was forced to decline because of pressure brought to bear on him by friends.

IT WAS LIKE RUBBING salt into an open wound the way an afternoon paper continued to publish unfavorable stories about the former mayor . . . and this may have helped him make up his mind not to re-enter the political arena.

AT ANY RATE, HINCH-cliffe's withdrawal from the shrievalty picture leaves Freeholder Ernest T. Scheidenmann and County Detective Chris Edell to battle it out for the nomination . . . and interesting to report in this connection is the rumor prevalent in some circles that had the popular Freeholder consulted party executives instead of going it alone, his desire for the sheriff's nomination would have been previously recognized.

TURNING FROM THE COUN-ty's scene to local matters, we learn that Jimmy Sees, who has done yeoman campaigning for the Democratic party in his mid-get "booster" car in the past, is in the race for the Alderman-ship of the Tenth Ward whether Bob Friend, incumbent, runs for re-election or not . . . Jimmy's a determined fellow and commands a large following on the city's Southside where he conducts a flourishing furniture business.

THE ALDERMAN'S JOB IN the Ninth ward is the object of an intense rivalry, too, with Bob Lobraico, well-known athletic figure, entered in the race against incumbent Alderman James Kearney . . . so serious is the challenge which Lobraico presents to the Kearney forces that pressure has been applied to have some of the former's most influential supporters withdraw their backing . . . but from all indications, Lobraico will be pitted against Kearney in the primary.

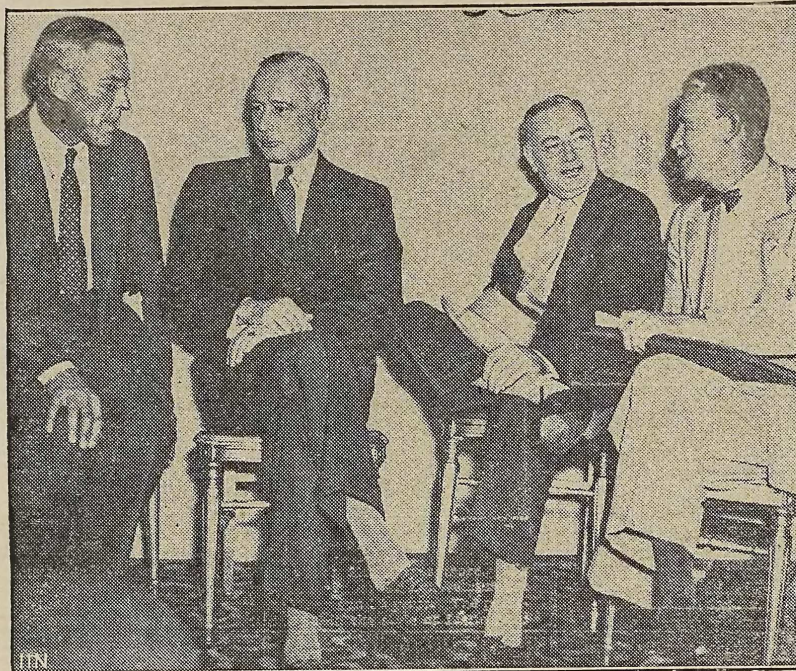

Vets Lining Up Behind Purcell In His Fight For Camp Hope Job

Will Send Delegation And Petitions To Freeholders, Civil Service Commission

The Alexander Hamilton Post of the American Legion this week took up the fight of William Purcell, World War Veteran, to set aside the recommendation of the appointment of Abram Roughgarden as permanent director of Camp Hope in favor of the former.

Basing its protest on a state statute which stipulates that should a veteran be among the first three qualifiers on a civil service examination, he must be appointed in preference to non-veterans, the Hamilton post was preparing a petition to the Board of Freeholders, which holds final appointive powers, asking that Purcell be named instead of Roughgarden.

Purcell finished second to Roughgarden in the civil service examination held for the post which involves a salary of \$2,700 to \$3,300 annually. Roughgarden has been asso-

ciated with the Camp Hope administration since it was founded in 1936. Purcell, too, has had extensive camp administration experience.

The Post also announced that it will send a similar petition to the New Jersey Civil Service Commission which must approve the Freeholders' appointment. A delegation of veterans will appear in person at the next meeting of the board of freeholders.

Two Dye Firms Under Hammer

Referee in Bankruptcy John Grimshaw, Jr., this week set the date of August 7, for the sale of the assets of the Sherwood Dye Works at 168 Madison street. Confirmation of the sale will take place on August 10. Another local firm which is scheduled to go under the hammer is the Trio Dye Works of 168 East 5th street.

SEES HEAVY VOTE
Increase In Registrations Is Basis Of Prediction

An "unusually heavy" number of registrations at the Passaic County Board of Elections for the summer months led Secretary Elizabeth Van D. Smith to predict that a heavy vote will be cast in the Fall. "Registrations are increasing rather than decreasing, despite the heat," Mrs. Smith commented. Many are "first voters."

Board Of Health Gets Federal Aid

Approval of a WPA project appropriating \$34,146 for the use of the Board of Health of the city of Paterson came from President Franklin D. Roosevelt in Washington this week. The project will enable the local board of health to enlarge its free clinic service which are now offered at Mill street headquarters and in public schools.

Term Up, Dosti In Jail Again

Must Face Charges On Three Old Indictments; Had Served 7 Year Prison Term

Thirty-nine-year-old Mohamed Dosti of this city was released from Trenton State Prison this week after serving a seven-year term for manslaughter, but he hardly had an opportunity to inhale a breath of free air before he was back behind bars again.

In County Jail

This time he is lodged in the county jail to await further prosecution on a charge of murdering his wife and two stepsons. Still listed against him are two indictments of murder and one of assault with intent to kill.

He has already served a term for the slaying of his stepson, Hyman Simmons, 20, being sentenced for manslaughter on December 15, 1932 by Judge Joseph A. Delaney. Now, if the prosecutor decides to act, he will have to answer indictments surrounding the death of his wife, Mrs. Minnie B. Dosti, 40, and his stepson, Benjamin, 17, in their 18 Arch street home on June 21, 1932.

Dosti's Version

Dosti, while on trial, said his wife had killed Hyman after the latter had slain Benjamin in a shooting fracas in their home. He said he then grabbed a gun from his wife's hand and—"everything went black."

Night Club Host Shooting Victim

Joseph Priore, proprietor of the Lido Venice night club at Lincoln Bridge, was shot early this morning when a bullet fired from a passing car pierced the window of his establishment and struck him in the arm.

The mysterious shooting occurred shortly after 3 a.m., Priore told police, as he and his employees were preparing to close the inn. He could not give police a motive for the shooting. Detectives Nicholas De Luccia, James Keys, Stephen Nauman and Joseph Sellner were assigned to the case.

HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Abbott Holmes of 14 East 22nd street was held for the grand jury on a charge of beating his wife.

18-Month WPA Rule Affects Thousands

Wholesale Lay-Offs Slated To Follow Congressional Act

Strike of Skilled Laborers, Meanwhile, Peters Out; Most Workers Return To Jobs

Thousands of WPA workers in this area were awaiting notice from project officials this week that their term of employment was at an end. They represent those WPA workers who are affected by a Federal ruling which stipulates that all who have been employed for 18 months or more on WPA must be dismissed.

The new policy is designed to give other needy persons an opportunity to obtain WPA employment, and also provides a means for laying off some 1,000,000 workers on government pay rolls all over the country.

May Affect 6,000

Some estimates had it that as high as 6,000 persons in Passaic county alone might be affected by the ruling.

"We have no alternative in the matter," John J. Gilooly, district supervisor of WPA, stated this week. "It is a congressional order."

"There will be no exceptions and frankly, I am more concerned about this situation than about the strike of skilled workers. Those who can least afford it will have to abide by the lay-off order," he stated.

Strike Abated

Confronting local WPA officials, too, is the strike of skilled workers in protest of the lengthening of working hours to 130 per month without a corresponding increase in pay.

The strike in Passaic county, however, has never reached serious proportions. According to Gilooly, no dismissal slips had been issued for local strikers as yet, and most have already returned to their posts.

The WPA Veterans' League will hold a family outing in Schweisguth's Grove, Clifton, on Sunday afternoon. Proceeds from the affair will go to the Boys' Musical Unit of the organization.

3,500 ATTEND

A crowd estimated at more than 3,500 persons attended the eleventh annual outing of the Paterson Saengerbund, Inc., at Idlewild Park in West Paterson Sunday.

Features of the day's program were band concerts, dancing, swimming and refreshments.

COP-HATER

Zambrino In Cell After Assaulting Patrolman

Salvatore Zambrino, 43, a saloonkeeper of 1120 Madison avenue, was in a cell this week after a fracas in which he is alleged to have assaulted Telegraph Officer Cyril Buysse of the police department, with a blunt instrument.

Zambrino, described as a "cop-hater", had resisted arrest when accosted by Buysse Sunday morning.

\$25,000 Suit Results From Child's Death

Suit for \$25,000 damages arising out of the death of his child was filed this week by Raffaele Vigorito of Wayne avenue in the state supreme court through his attorney, former Assistant Prosecutor Louis Santorfo.

Defendant in the case is Harry Ehrman of Browerton, N. J., whose car struck and killed 11-year-old Carmine Vigorito as the latter was riding a bicycle on West Broadway near Totowa avenue on July 15, 1937.

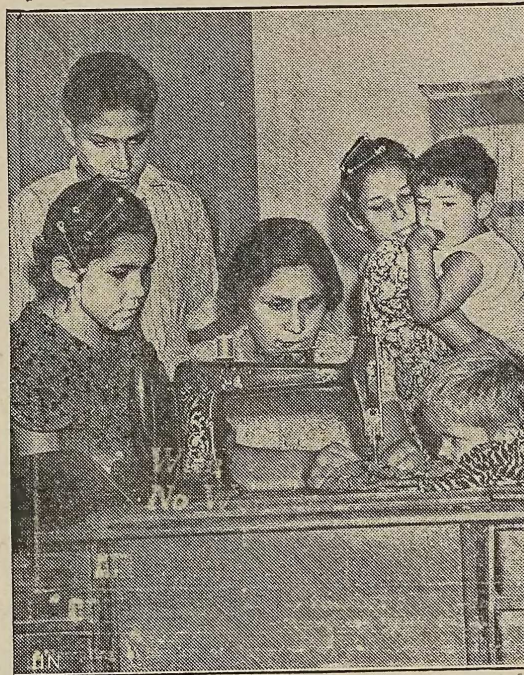
Nation Mourns Him

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A PLAYGROUND IS PROVIDED

Good news for the residents of the First District of the Seventh Ward comes in the announcement by Mayor Bernard L. Stafford to the effect that a playground for children will be established in that section of the city.

As this newspaper has pointed out, the situation in that section of the city, as far as the welfare of children was concerned, was deplorable. Mayor Stafford's promptness in recognizing the need is commendable and his sincerity in solving the problem is evident in the fact that he has ordered the creation of a temporary, supervised play zone by shutting off traffic in one of the streets of that district, until a permanent playground can be set up.

That the administration is alive to the wants of the many groups which make up the city's large population is also illustrated by the attentive ear which was lent to the petitions of the residents of the First district of the Seventh ward and the promptness with which their request for protection for their children at play was complied.

Thought for today: The American birth rate has been falling; our death rate has also been falling; hence, our population has steadily been getting older.

TOUGH ON THE ARSONIST

Times are getting tougher for that most despicable of criminals, the arsonist—due to the splendid work of fire insurance organizations, of police departments, of prosecuting authorities and of the courts.

As a report of the Committee on Incendiarism and Arson of the National Board of Fire Underwriters observes, "The past year has been one of continued activity and success as shown by the number of investigations made and the activity of public authorities in making arrests and prosecutions." After many years of constant work, a system finally has been developed which makes the professional fire-bug's chance of escape from detection extremely low.

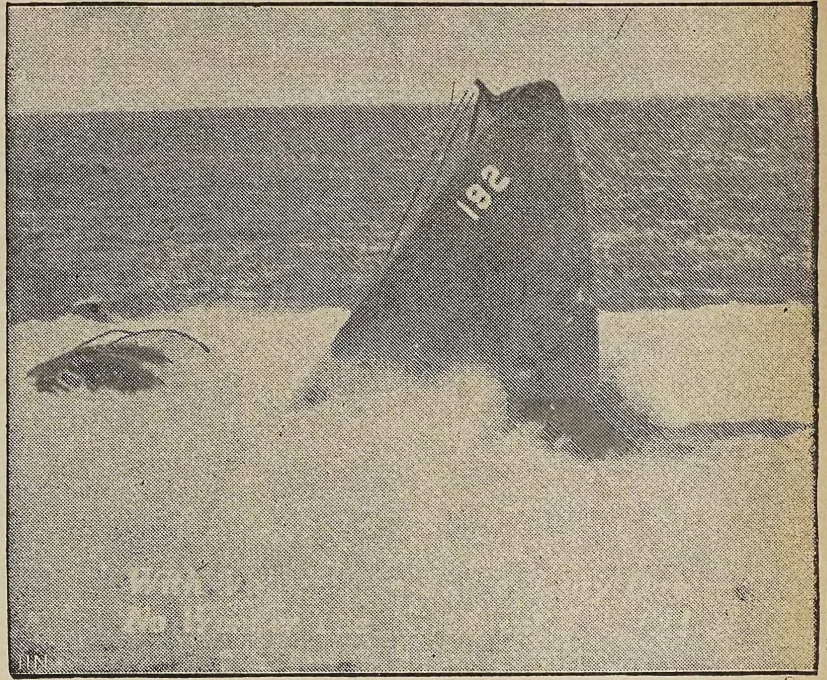
The records of the National Board, covering cases in which their agents participated, show a steady increase in the percentage of convictions following arrests and, generally speaking, a decline in the percentage of acquittals. This means that greater care is being taken in gathering evidence, and greater zeal is being shown by prosecutors—to the end that the arsonist finds fewer legal loopholes which once made it relatively easy for him to escape the just punishment for his crime.

Of tremendous importance is the success achieved in breaking up the "arson rings" which periodically operate about the country. Under the ring system, arson is a business. Some rings have operated for years, and have defrauded insurance companies and others of fortunes. The arson fighters have paid special attention to these criminals, and the result is that scores of them are now behind bars, serving long sentences.

The war against arson should have unanimous public support. The "torch" deserves no sympathy. He does deserve the severest possible punishment.

The daily press is again telling the public what to do in respect to keeping President Roosevelt at the head of the government, unmindful of the fact that the public, in 1936, paid no attention to its demand that he be defeated for re-election.

Bulna Locked In County Jail To Await Trial

Victim Is Laid To Rest; Deny Prisoner Bail

Court Of Oyer And Terminer, Judge Delancy Presiding, To Be Scene Of Trial

Twenty-one-year-old Andrew Bulna of 277 Twelfth avenue was in the county jail this week, held without bail to await trial in the Court of Oyer and Terminer for the murder of his wife, Josephine Jean Pelka Bulna, also 21, last Sunday morning.

Relatives meanwhile bade farewell to the young woman who was choked to death by her mate after an argument which arose at the conclusion of a Saturday night round of drinking, at funeral services held here yesterday.

Relatives Shocked

They refused to believe that Bulna had murdered his young wife, who was the mother of one child and was expecting the birth of another in the near future. They said he had always been kind and attentive to his wife and declared it was "unkindable that he could have killed her."

Meanwhile, the county prosecutor was preparing the state's case against Bulna on the basis of the confession which the youthful husband signed.

Result Of Quarrel

Bulna, a painter, is said to have confessed choking his wife to death after she had insisted upon winding up a night's round of local taverns with a visit to the Park Grill in Passaic. After he had throttled her, he is said to have rested his wife's head on his shoulder and driven home with her lifeless body in that position to avoid suspicion.

The couple had been married for one and one-half years. One daughter was born of the marriage and another child was expected by Mrs. Bulna, until Sunday morning's tragedy intervened.

Job Insurance Totals \$187,501

A total of \$187,501.54 was paid out in the form of job insurance compensation in Passaic county during the month of June, according to a report made public this week by Executive Director Harold G. Hoffman of the Unemployment Compensation Commission.

A total of 21,530 benefit payments were made here during the month, the report showed.

Police Finally Identify Woman Who Died Here

Paterson police finally identified the "mystery woman" who died in the General hospital Sunday morning as Mrs. Ruth Griswold of Maywood, Illinois, this week.

Mrs. Griswold's identity had been a mystery to the authorities ever since she was admitted to the local hospital last July 7. Death was caused by hemorrhage, nephritis, and bronchial pneumonia, County Physician Lawrence B. Boylan and Dr. A. H. Davis announced.

She had left her husband and two children in Maywood, Ill., last February 18 and was visiting a Mrs. Saundry of 299 Van Houten street when stricken.

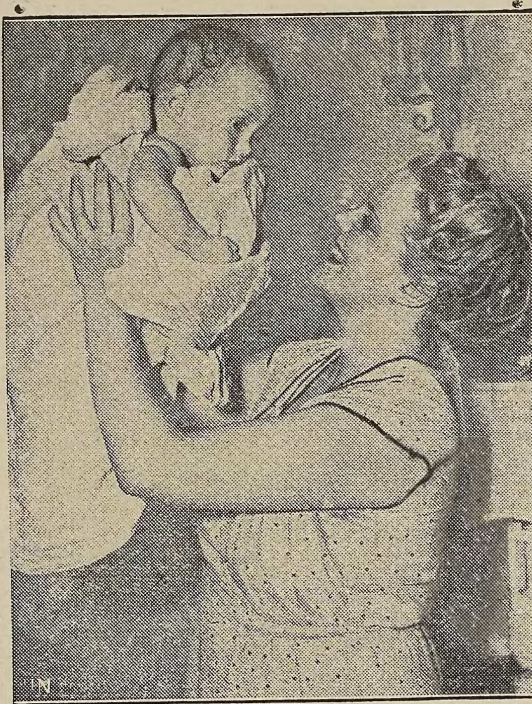
A total of 40 applications for the job of parking meter collector in a single day was noted this week at the Civil Service office in the Court House annex. The examination will be held here next Thursday.

Because he erected a building without a permit, Constantino D'Argenio of 163 Lyon street was fined \$25 this week.

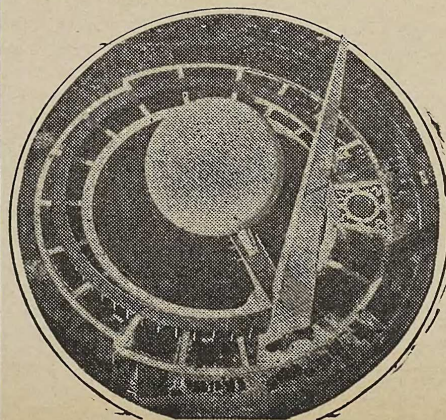

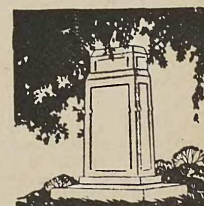

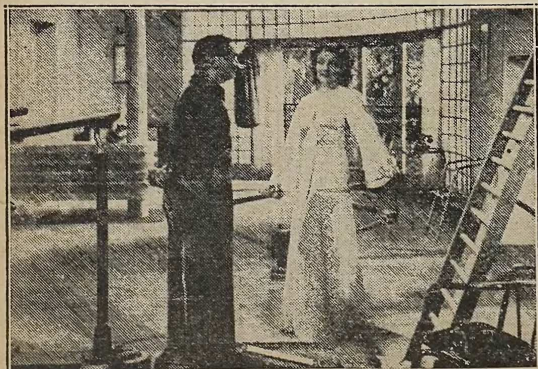
