Members of Paterson's police department will take competitive Civil Service examinations for promotions here on Wednesday and Thursday, according to an announcement today by Police Commissioner Thomas J. Brogan, Jr.

Many key posts in the department will be filled by the means of these examinations. They include the offices of Chief of Police, Captain of Police, Lieutenant of Police and Police Sergeant.

4 Seek Chief's Post

A great deal of interest centers about the competition for the post of Police Chief which has been filled by an acting chief for some time. Eligible for this post are Acting Chief Lawrence J. Dunn, Captain Stephen J. Jorlett, Captain James Walker and Captain Patrick Clune.

Both Jorlett and Dunn have been acting chiefs at various times since the death of Chief John J. Murphy made that post vacant.

Many To Compete

Nine men have already filed their applications for the post of Police Captain while 21 seek a lieutenant, and some 170 patrolmen are applying for the right to take examinations for sergeantcies.

The last examination of this type was held here in 1932. Appointments will be made from the Civil Service list by the Police and Fire Commission in accordance with the regulations.

The flag will be 12 by 18 feet in size, while the pole, made of steel, will be 60 feet in height and will be placed on the lawn of the hospital.

City Honors Memory Of Columbus

Sellitti Asks All To Take Part In Local Tribute To Explorer

Exercises Scheduled To Be Held At Eastside H. S. After Parade

The city of Paterson, led by local Italian-American societies, was today observing Columbus day with a parade and exercises scheduled for the Eastside high school auditorium.

The celebration of the discovery of America by the great explorer, Christopher Columbus, followed the same pattern of similar observances here in the past. This year, however, it was prefaced by an appeal by Benjamin Sellitti, president of the Columbus Day Committee, for the entire population to join with the Italian-American societies which are sponsoring the program of the day.

"Belongs To World"

"Columbus is not to be considered as appertaining solely to a particular country or to a particular race," Mr. Sellitti explained. "But, having conveyed his intellectual production to the entire human race, he is to be considered as belonging to the entire world."

Speaking for the Columbus Day committee, he continued:

"It is our duty, therefore, as broad-minded American citizens, to make the Columbus day celebration one of the most impressive events of the year."

Asks All To Join

"For thirty years the Italian-Americans have celebrated Columbus Day in the city of Paterson. Now the desire of these Italian-Americans is that other patriotic organizations, such as the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Knights of Columbus, etc., take the lead in this celebration."

Today's program calls for a parade from Cross and Ellison streets to Eastside high school where the principal address of the day will be delivered by Dr. Vinso Comito of "Il Progresso Italo Americano." Other speakers will be Louis Santoro and possibly Mayor Bernard L. Stafford. A musical program is also to be presented.

Such well known Paterson citizens as Mayor Stafford, Recorder Duffy, William Furrey, Senator Gardner, Dr. Patella, Frank Palleria, Lloyd B. Marsh, Thomas F. Vigorito, Dr. A. Borluso and Peter Cimmino are among the invited guests.

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DANGERS OF HYSTERIA

Public sentiment is ruthlessly opposed to war profiteering. But in curbing it, care must be taken not to destroy or impair the efficiency of legitimate enterprises. Hysterical regulation and indiscriminate condemnation would prove far more inimical to American institutions and the general welfare in the long run, than the activities of all the war profiteers combined.

Thurman W. Arnold, Assistant Attorney General of the United States, has pointed out that the Sherman Act stands as the front line defense against unbalanced prices and arbitrary price control. Rigid enforcement of the anti-trust laws should obviate necessity for extensive additional government regulation of industry in the present emergency.

Speaking in behalf of the anti-trust division of the Department of Justice, Mr. Arnold declared: "We do not wish to destroy combinations which pass on savings to consumers through economical marketing methods or efficiency of mass production. It is not the size itself, but the creation of bottle necks and toll bridges in the distribution of a product which is unreasonable under the law."

At the present time mass merchandising and distributive organizations throughout the country are joining with the government in a concerted effort to shield the consuming public against the disturbing backwash of high prices which heretofore have been the inevitable result of war. The problems of eliminating the war racketeer and placing a brake on prices, will be far simpler with the help of a sane, cooperative and understanding attitude on the part of the public.

Group Forms To Keep U. S. Out Of War

Calls Meeting For October 20 To Lay Plans

War. Profiteering Will Also Be Target Of Labor, Civic Coalition

Civic leaders of Passaic county will meet here on Friday evening, October 20, to plan a program of action to aid America in keeping out of war.

The group, representing taxpayers and labor organizations, has set 28 Cross street as the scene of the session, it was announced.

Rap Profiteering

Not only is the conference out to block the possibility of American entry into the way, but it hopes to add its voice to the nation-wide movement to prevent and eliminate all forms of war profiteering.

What means the group will take are as yet undetermined, but it is expected that a county-wide demonstration of some sort will be held, most likely in Paterson, within the next several weeks.

Represented at the preliminary conference which laid plans for the meeting on October 20 were 16 local organizations including the Taxpayers' League, the Workers Alliance, fraternal organizations and both American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organization unions.

The methods now being used to enlist the aid of other organizations in the county consists of sending delegates to their meetings to explain the motives and purposes of the conference which is tentatively known as the Citizens' Committee Against War and Profiteering.

The next meeting will begin promptly at 8 o'clock on Friday evening, October 20.

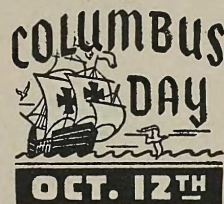

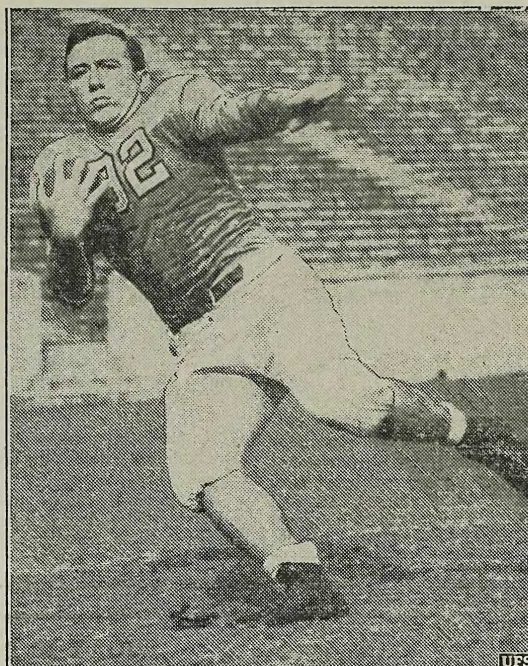
