— STRAWBERRIES. —

The cultivation of small fruits being very profitable, it is claiming the attention of Market Men generally. One gentleman residing in this County, sold on an average of Seventy-Five Bushels daily, for fifteen days, during the past season, which if followed with Raspberries and Blackberries (succeeding each other so closely that the same Boxes and Pickers required for one would serve for all,) would make a few acres of land yield more profit, than a larger farm does with ordinary culture.

Having about four acres in Strawberries, growing in separate beds, with Trees or Plants between them, so as to prevent running together, I can furnish in large quantities, those varieties that have proven most valuable with me for market, having regard to size, flavor, beauty, productiveness, firmness of Fruit and hardiness of the Plants.

The following select list embraces the several qualities above mentioned; (P) denotes Pistillate Plants bearing blossoms, defective in male organs; (H) denotes Hermaphrodite varieties bearing blossoms, perfect in both organs. Starnate Plants producing male blossoms only have been discarded.

Commence, and persons carrying on the former business are already equipped for the latter, which are easily cultivated and very profitable.

Raspberries should be planted in deep rich soil, the hills six feet apart each way, and three plants put in a hill, requiring 3630 Plants to the acre. The tops should be cut down to within a few inches of the ground, that the roots may become well established before they are required to supply nourishment for long tops of green foliage. Stakes or rails are not necessary in field culture; tie the tops of each hill together and they will support themselves. The ground should be thoroughly cultivated and have a coat of manure every Fall.

A new Plantation should be formed once in seven or eight years.

—BLACKBERRIES—

Commence soon after the Raspberry season is over, and continue in bearing till the latter part of Summer.

The fruit of the NEW ROCHELLE being very *large and luscious*, is a general favorite and brought last year in Philadelphia Market *twenty five cents per quart* the whole season; the demand at that price could not be supplied.

Four feet apart each way is a proper distance for planting; the crown of the plant should be about even with the surface and have a little earth thrown over it for protection. It will require 2722 plants per acre.

Persons ordering Trees or Plants should state particularly by what route or routes they wish their packages sent. A reasonable charge will be made for packing in mats or boxes. All packages will be delivered in Philadelphia free of charge, and forwarded by Railroad or Vessels to any destination, but the proprietor will not be responsible for their safe carriage or future growth.

All orders from unknown correspondents must be accompanied with the cash or satisfactory reference in Philadelphia.
