The Newark Academy

Is divided into seven departments, and each department is sub divided into classes. New pupils are assigned to these classes according to their attainments as determined by examination The Teachers keep a daily record of punctuality, conduct, and scholarship of each pupil, which is entered in a diary and sent to the parents or guardian, at the close of each week.

Promotions are made when the pupil has completed the course prescribed for the lower grade, and passed a satisfactory examination on the same.

Thoroughness on the part of pupils is secured by thorough instruction in small classes, and by exacting close attention to study.

The course embraced in the several departments, includes Reading, Spelling. Arithmetic, Penmanship, Grammar, Geography, Composition, Declamation, Elocution, History, Drawing, Algebra, Book-Keeping, Natural Philosophy, Astronomy, Geometry, Trigonometry, Surveying, Civil Engineering, Chemistry, Mineralogy, Physiology, French, German, Latin & Greek.

Elocution and Composition are not mere formal exercises, but particular attention is given, to make them the the subject of systematic instruction and study.

The number of pupils attending this year is 260; the number of teachers employed, 10.
