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GENEROSO POPE TO SPEAK AT ITALIAN DEMO RALLY

Italian members of the Democratic party will sponsor a huge political rally at Eastside high school tomorrow night under the direction of the Italian division of the Democratic party. Generoso Pope, publisher of the Italian newspapers, "Il Progresso" and "Corriere d'America" will be the principal speaker of the evening.

Others who will speak are Mayor Hinchliffe and candidates for county offices on the Democratic ticket. Professor Alfred N. Borluso, chairman in charge of the evening's arrangements, announced today.

Associated with Professor Borluso in handling the organization of the rally are Ralph Jordan, Carl Lembo, City Attorney Salvatore D. Viviano, Assistant Prosecutor Louis P. Santorf, Anthony Grossi, Joseph A. Giannini, and Former Alderman Joseph G. Sproviere.

Night School To Start At Central High Tonight

Night schools in Paterson were scheduled to open their doors for regular classes tonight after a delay which was caused by the lack of funds for sponsoring the project. The enterprise is being made possible this year by the securing of ample WPA funds.

Classes will be held on Mondays Tuesday, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays in the evening from 7:15 to 9:15 o'clock. The chief center of evening school activity will be in the Central high school building. Enrollment starts tomorrow evening.

Local Catholics Add To Bishop Walsh's Fund

The sum of \$69,235 was added to the total of \$160,235 already subscribed by Catholic laymen at a series of banquets given in honor of the Most Reverend Bishop Thomas J. Walsh, the latest of which was held at the Alexander Hamilton Hotel here last night.

At this affair, the fund total rose to the sum of \$229,490 as more than 400 guests who attended contributed generously toward the realization of a drive which will culminate in the construction of new buildings for the Immaculate Conception Seminary at Dartington, Bergen County.

The complete sum needed for this project is \$1,500,000 and will be raised in its entirety by Catholic laymen in the Newark Diocese, it was announced.

GARDNER SETS INSPECTOR FREE OF CONTEMPT

On October 28th a hearing was held in the Passaic Police Court on Order to Show Cause why John J. Cummings, a State Motor Vehicle Inspector, should not be held in contempt of court for certain statements made by him in Passaic Police Court on October 14, 1936. The hearing was conducted before Judge Walter H. Gardner, Democratic candidate for State Senator.

The alleged contempt of Inspector Cummings was committed in the presence of Carl Nitto, who was the acting Judge on October 14th. It was alleged that Inspector Cummings, the complainant in a case heard that day was displeased at the decision rendered by Judge Nitto and attacked the court alleging that it was influenced by politics.

At the hearing on the contempt charge, Inspector Cummings stated that newspapers had incorrectly quoted his remarks and that he intended no criticism of the court. Upon his making an apology Judge Gardner dismissed the complaint after a short lecture.

LEMBO BACKS GARDNER FOR STATE SENATE

At a series of rallies held in the Third Ward, Paterson, last week, Carl Lembo, standard bearer of the Carl Lembo Association, urged the election of Judge Walter H. Gardner to the State Senate.

Lembo advocated Gardner's election on the grounds "that Charles K. Barton, G. O. P. candidate, was a tool of the banking interests and did not have the poor, downtrodden at heart."

Frank Vitrone, speaking at similar rallies, called for new blood in the State Senate and pronounced Judge Gardner as the remedy for all ills which have "been incurred during the Republican administration of this position."

NAN DONOHUE TELLS OF STATE SCHOOL NEEDS

Addressing the Italian-American Democratic club this week, Mrs. Nan Donohue, candidate for the assembly on the Democratic ticket,

called attention of voters to state school needs.

"Breaking pledges to the people has become one of the most common offenses in public life," Mrs. Donohue said. "We find examples of this in school financing."

"These two issues—tax revision and school financing—are linked as one. Both demand the attention of the next state legislature."

A BRIEF HISTORY OF "IL MESSAGGERO"

"IL MESSAGGERO" was founded in 1904 by the late Nicholas Parrillo in conjunction with a company organized to acquire the rights of "Il Vindice," a political newspaper. The group of men who organized "IL MESSAGGERO" and appointed Mr. Parrillo as manager included Robert Geyer, Doctor Colacurcio, Peter Cimmino, S. Bonanno, and S. Cristillo.

In its infancy, "IL MESSAGGERO" was a bi-weekly publication among whose stockholders were Robert H. Fordyce, later mayor of Paterson, and John Stagg, then chief of the Paterson Fire Department. The first set of officers were John Stagg, president; Peter Cimmino, secretary-treasurer, and Nicholas Parrillo, manager.

Later, "IL MESSAGGERO" was issued regularly at weekly intervals and continues this policy until this day, which marks its thirty-second anniversary of publication.

In 1914, Mr. Parrillo took complete charge of both the stock and management of "IL MESSAGGERO" and maintained control until his death in 1929, after which his son, Vincent S. Parrillo, assumed complete charge of the publication.

Barton Tells Of Workings Of N. J. State Government

In several addresses delivered last evening at Republican meetings, Commissioner Charles Barton, Republican candidate for state senator, described the workings of the state government and compared it to a business corporation.

"The State of New Jersey is a huge municipal corporation," stated Commissioner Barton, "and it must be conducted along the same lines as successful private business corporations are operated to be successful and in order to progress. It therefore becomes necessary when electing representatives to choose those who have business experience."

"As the Republican candidate for state senator I feel that my many years in the business world, with the special training in commerce and industry, qualifies me for the post."

Madrid Bombs Rebels; Council Acquits Italy

Madrid—Government forces today claimed the most significant victory of the war to suppress the rebellion after bombing the Tabalada airfield in Seville and destroying five Junkers bombing planes and nearby hangars.

The Madrid government also reported that it had wreaked similar damage at airports in Granada and Caceres. According to its reports, panic and wreckage were spread among the ranks of the rebels.

Italy Acquitted

In England, the "hands off Spain" committee acquitted both Italy and Portugal of interfering in the Spanish revolution despite the strenuous objections of Russia.

The vote in three separate instances on the question was unanimous.

Lotte Renamed President Of Local C. of C.

C. Walter Lotte was re-elected president of the chamber of commerce of the city at a meeting of that body yesterday.

Lotte had expressed a desire to retire from office, but was prevailed upon to reconsider and accept office for another year.

Other officers named at yesterday's meeting were; H. W. Dossair, first vice president; Albert Welley second vice-president and John T. Deighton, treasurer.

COUNTY VOTE RISES 11,217

Passaic County Board of Elections said this week there was an increase of 11,217 persons in the number of registered voters in Passaic, Clifton and Paterson this year.

This increase is made up of 2,560 more in Passaic this year than last; 2,196 additional in Clifton and 6,461 in Paterson.

Passaic's total number of eligible voters is 26,410; made up of 3,733 in the First Ward; 7,132 in the Second; 8,249 in the Third and 7,296 in the Fourth.

Clifton's total is 22,557; divided into five wards; 3,965 in the First; 4,037 in the Second; 5,441 in the Third; 4,563 in the Fourth and 4,551 in the Fifth.

Paterson has a total voting population of 66,020 or 17,053 more than the combined votes of Passaic

Spanish Trade At Standstill, Loss Is Terrific; Long Time Rebuilding

A virtual halt to business has been called in Spain because of the civil war. The Commerce Department at Washington said the total cost to business and industry undoubtedly will run into hundreds of millions of dollars.

Besides loss of property, torn to pieces in cannonading, these officials declared there will be additional costs in prolonged disruption of trade and in the war toll of business "manpower."

Business in Spain started a swift descent immediately upon outbreak of the conflict in July, it was said and at present little of the former commercial structure remains. Officials expressed the view that, regardless of the outcome of the war, it would require lengthy painstaking effort to restore former economic conditions.

From the long range view, it was said, one of Spain's most serious business setbacks will be the loss

of foreign markets to other nations. Substantial losses in foreign trade with the United States during July and August already have been recorded, and a further decline is expected to be shown in figures for September.

American losses in Spain cannot be estimated, but officials in the commercial law division of the Foreign and Domestic Commerce Bureau said they were advising persons whose property has been destroyed to file claims with the State Department.

These claims, it was said, may serve as evidence of loss, if and when Spain starts to make reparation.

Since the middle of last month the Commerce Department has had no official business reports from Spain. Its commercial attaches have been forced to leave their posts by the increasing intensity of hostilities.

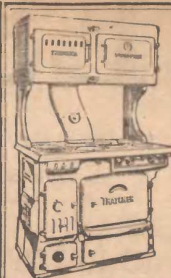
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POLITICAL POOP DECK

A rendezvous with those who delve in things political. . . . A bit from here and there on the campaign's progress

This column being the final offering of your correspondent along the political front, it seems fitting that it be leased out to both parties for their individual last words.

We have attempted to make our comparisons and presentations of the individual candidates as impartial as can be adjudged fair. You may have our assurance that there was no personal gain for the writer in praise of a particular candidate, nor has either party been favored more than the other in search of a party favor.

Herewith are the Republican and Democratic sides of the story.

THE REPUBLICANS SAY:

Nearing a blazing climax, the G.O.P. victory campaign this week finds every Republican candidate in the county putting forth extra effort as the voters prepare to register their choice on November 3.

The county ticket offers a blend of experience, ability and balanced representation. In Charles K. Barton, the Republicans point to his record as deputy register of deeds, sinking fund commissioner, and present head of the fire and police board of Paterson. He is a man the G.O.P. believes will be useful in the state senate carrying with him an extensive knowledge of finance and law and an understanding of human problems.

Harry Page, shrievalty candidate, has been a happy campaigner. Possessed of an abundance of homespun philosophy, this successful businessman has found warm and hearty welcomes in every part of the county.

The younger element of the party is well represented in William P. Furrey, candidate for register of deeds. Bill's organizing ability has been proven in the Paterson tax assessor's office where he is president of the board. The campaign committee points to this record and his valuable experience in the field of real estate.

Divided representation and wide administrative experience is offered by the freeholder candidates, Crine Kievit, of Clifton and Nicholas Martini, of Passaic. Mr. Kievit is former mayor of Clifton and Mr. Martini is street commissioner of Passaic. Both possess sound appreciation of municipal problems and the administration of government.

The veteran assembly candidates comprised of Betty Smith, John McNaughton, Harry J. Donahue, and Oscar R. Wilensky stand four square on their record. In their campaign they point to their work in the legislature sponsoring constructive programs and their willingness to meet all major problems with courage.

THE DEMOCRATS SAY:

It is the prediction of Water Commissioner Robert J. Neilley, leader of the Democratic party in Passaic, that Passaic will go Democratic by at least 5,000 votes in next week's election. The confident city leader made the prediction in the presence of one of the largest Democratic gatherings in recent political history at the Ritz ballroom.

Friday's rally was in general for State Senator William H. Smathers, who opposes U. S. Senator W. Warren Barbour at the polls next week.

Smathers hit Barbour on the count that his adversary voted for the soldiers' bonus bill "to save his political hide" and supported the Social Security Act "for political expediency".

Walter Hunziker, campaign manager of the Democrats, was generally confident that his entire ticket would sweep the election next week. And he was equally as confident that President Roosevelt would be re-elected, besides carrying the county.

In Police Court Judge Walter H. Gardner, the Democrats have a worthy candidate for the State Senator position. Judge Gardner has garnered a wide knowledge of law and experience, not only on the bench but in daily human contact with the workings of the law in everyday life. He has definite ideas on the necessity of more constructive laws in our Legislature, and with his election, the county electorate will know they have a responsible man going to "bat" for them at all times.

The candidacy of John A. Gavin is one of the bright spots of the Democratic county ticket. "Jack" Gavin is outwardly fitted for the task of conducting the sheriff's office because of his business experience and his complete knowledge of the department's needs. His youth is a decided asset in his favor and does not detract from his experience, but should certainly give him added energy for the duties of this office.

Friends of William P. Leary hope to see him elected Register of Deeds. The popular Democrat has been active in many campaigns and is certainly deserving of the complete support of his party in quest of this important office.

Both Freeholders Ernest Scheidemann and Augustine M. King stand squarely on their records. Freeholder Scheidemann points with

particular pride to his accomplishment at Camp Hope this past summer, was a member of the Board of Freeholders in 1931 and was re-elected in 1934, and in this position he has rendered outstanding public service. He was also a member of the Passaic County Welfare Home Board, to which he gave of his time and energy unstintingly. where underprivileged boys of this county were provided with the fresh air camp facilities in their battles for restored health. There have been other accomplishments of both Freeholders, and Democrats in the county feel their records merit re-election of both men.

General Assembly candidates Gabriel C. Roberto, Carroll J. Stark, Mrs. Nan V. Donahue and David Harrison have each experience—filled records in private and public life. They have rounded careers in assistance of civic projects in their home communities and they have an understanding of the needs of this county and this state in the lower house.

CANDIDATES FOR CONGRESS

County voters are presented Congressman George N. Seger, seeking another term in office, to rank as one of the ten leading members of the House, if re-elected. His record is a matter of public history. As head of the Board of Education and Mayor of this city many years and later the city's finance commissioner, his early work in public office suited him well for his later years in Congress. He, more than any candidate in this election, has only his wonderful record in the house to offer the electorate of the county.

His opponent, Dr. Leo V. Becker, has been a staunch Democrat and active in civic affairs in Paterson many years. Dr. Becker is a keen student of philosophy and economy and is a distinguished linguist. He

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VOTE ON TUESDAY

Once again, on Tuesday, November 3, the local electorate will go to the polls to practice their right of suffrage.

The number of men running for office and the number of important offices this year in our community, county and state contests, is overshadowed by the Presidential election. It is true that the nation's future is at stake, and we best feel that every person vote for the man he or she feels can best navigate the ship of the nation. We have not, during this campaign, voiced our approval or disfavor of either candidate in the Presidential election because the issues which have piled up from week to week would have been far too lengthy for a sane discussion by a weekly newspaper with limited editorial columns.

We urge, however, that you study closely the qualifications of the present chief executive, President Roosevelt and, Governor Alf M. Landon, of Kansas, Democratic and Republican candidates respectively. If you believe a change in president will aid the country in its recovery program, vote for Landon, and if you feel that the present President can best direct the program of recovery, re-elect Roosevelt.

The proportions of our county contests revolve about election of a State Senator, Sheriff, two Freeholders, a Register of Deeds and Mortgages, and four members of the General Assembly. Both parties have formidable slates.

The Republican party is particularly proud of the candidacy of Charles K. Barton for the State Senatorial office, while we admit the strength of his adversary Police Court Judge Walter H. Gardner, Democratic hope, will lead to a nip and tuck battle for this post. Judging from all-round popularity and ability, it may be true that the elder candidate will emerge victorious in this battle.

Republican candidates Commissioner Nicholas Martini and former Clifton Mayor Crine Kievit are pitted against two strong foes in incumbent Freeholders Ernest Scheidemann and Augustine M. King.

The battle for the sheriff's roost is being waged between the two most evenly matched men on both tickets. Harry Page and John A. Gavin would seem the most logical co sheriffs this newspaper could conceive. But in politics, any such Utopian setup would not be permitted, these men must face each other at the polls, to await the decision of the electorate. Both are men of considerable ability and both have clearly demonstrated that their experience and sincerity will suit either of them for the office. This contest appears to be a toss-up and we can only add: "May the better man win".

In the contest for Register of Deeds, William P. Furrey, President of the Paterson Board of Assessors appears to have the edge over William P. Leary, Democratic candidate opposed to the popular Republican. Mr. Furrey has built up an enviable record in the Assessor's post in Paterson and seem very well fitted for the job to succeed Register John H. Morris.

Our Assembly candidates face the electorate each year with accounts of difficult years in office. Some-

times we wonder why, after all such travail and aggravation of a year in office in the General Assembly, these candidates are so eager to enter the ring the following year. Of course, we admit the prestige and experience is an admirable asset, but the aggravation and concern over fighting for an election every year, appears to be a hardship on these candidates. We feel, for that reason, that your careful scrutiny of the records of these candidates, and the capabilities of those seeking the office for the first time is entirely in order. Next Tuesday will certainly be a red letter day!

September Sees An Advance Of 54 P.C. In Building Activity

September's building construction activity, based on permits filed, although responding to a usual seasonal decline from the previous month, was 54 per cent greater than in September, 1935, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins announced this week.

"The decline in the value of permits issued in September compared with August was attributable entirely to the contraction in public building," she explained. "If private building is taken by itself, the value of permits issued show an advance of 1 per cent during the month."

All types of building construction showed gains over last year, the Labor Secretary said. The value of new residential construction registered an increase of 111 per cent, non-residential building advanced 19 per cent, and the value of additions, alterations and repairs rose 31 per cent.

A recapitulation of permits for the elapsed nine months of the year show that building in cities with a population of 10,000 or over was estimated at \$997,924,000 a gain of 71 per cent over the 1934 period. Residential construction permit values increased 129 per cent, non-residential 49 per cent, and additions, alterations and repairs, 33 per cent.

The data collected by the Bureau of Labor Statistics include, in addition to private construction, the value of buildings for which contracts were awarded by Federal and State Governments in the larger cities. For September the value of these buildings amounted to \$13,185,000 compared with \$9,314,000 in September 1935.

FHA Reports Gain Of 216.2 Per Cent

Savings, building and loan associations have increased their participation in the Federal housing Administration's insured mortgage system to \$71,052,396 on September 1, from \$22,474,034 on January 1. a gain of 216.2 per cent.

This compares with a gain of 187 per cent by all participating institutions for the first eight months of the year. In the same period the associations increased their share of the grand total of mortgages accepted for insurance from 15.5 per cent to 17.1 per cent.

Steady gains throughout this year so far have been made by savings, building and loan associations in their number and in their percentage of all institutions approved as mortgagees.

At the beginning of this year the Housing Administration had approved 8,046 private financial institutions as mortgagees, of which, 1,636 or 20.3 per cent were savings, building and loan associations.

F.H.A. Loans For New Jersey Homes Total \$1,362,580

Administrator Stewart McDonald announced that New Jersey building and loan associations made loans totalling \$1,362,580 for the construction of new homes under the Federal Housing Administration insured mortgage plan during the Summer months of May, June, July and August.

This provided for the construction of 257 residences, the average loan for this purpose being \$5,241 and brings the total of new construction loans since the inauguration of the insured mortgage plan up to \$2,227,480.

"During August, these associations made 57 new construction loans accepted by us for insurance amounting to \$244,000 which was 19.11 per cent. of the total of \$1,276,900 made by all leading insti-

tutions in that State," stated Mr. McDonald. "Their total of 124 loans for all purposes during August was \$549,140 an increase of 10.01 per cent. over July, bringing their grand total to \$6,036,460. This represents 18.14 per cent of the total of \$38,279,537 in mortgage loans accepted for insurance from all approved financial institutions there. The average of loans for all purposes was \$4,997.
