TO ALL OUTWARD APpearances, there seems to be some logic in the rumor . . . for to date, Recorder Duffy has not filed his petition for a place on the ballot . . . and has not opened headquarters for a campaign . . . these are matters to which his rival, Commissioner Gavin, has already attended well, we're patient enough to wait and see what transpires, 5,540 Persons Off and that's exactly what we'll do.

GAVIN SUPPORTERS ARE presenting an interesting argument for the benefit of those who have prematurely labeled Duffy the "organization" candidate, and their man, the "insurgent" candidate . . . they insist that the Duffy League, of which the Police Recorder is the standard-bearer, has been something less than an organization supporter, having refused to endorse Mayor Bernard L. Stafford when he ran for office two years ago, and to this day, declining to take part in the annual outing of the United Democratic Clubs of Passaic County, an undertaking which has every other group's cooperation and support.

Private employment provided jobs for 2,395 persons, the WPA took 1,149 off the list and Unemployment Compensation was paid to 192 persons in this city during that period.

It was also emphasized that no headquarters had been set up by Duffy supporters and that no campaign literature had as yet been prepared.



# WPA To Prune 4,000 Here By Sept. I

# **New List Of 10,000** To Replace 27,000 Throughout State

World War Veterans Exempted From Dismissal By Congressional Order

September 1 was set as the deadline for the dismissal of 27,-000 New Jersey WPA workers in line with a congressional order by State WPA Adminis-trator Robert W. Allan this

Of the 27,000 men and woman who will get their "403" slips in the intervening period, Allan said, 5,000 will come from the Passaic-Bergen counties dis trict of WPA.

#### 18-Month Rule

Only war veterans are exempt the congressional order which compels the WPA to drop all who have been employed for 18 months or more previous to the order.

Accordingly, Allan will issue dismissals to 27,000 persons throughout the state who are now on WPA rolls. In their stead, a total of 10,000 new persons will be hired, thus effecting a reduction of 17,000 in personnel. This will leave 59,000 persons still on the payroll of WPA—the legal quota.

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



# Quackenbush Co. Head Calls Tax "Ruinous"

Says Its Passage In Legislature Will Signal Immediate Fight For Repeal

A one percent retail sales tax which he said was being pushed by certain forces in the state legislature will be "ruinous" to business, G. Karl Wilson, Quackenbush department store executions and the state of the state warned this week.

Wilson, speaking for the Retail Merchants' Association of New Jersey, declared that his organization would fight the proposed tax to the bitter end.

"Intolerable Burden"
"Any general sales tax in New Jersey means that a campaign street." for repeal will start the day such a tax is passed. "The modified sales tax which

we are advised certain political leaders have in mind would be an intolerable burden on New Jersey consumers and a wanton legislative destruction of the retail industry of this state.

### Time "Inopportune"

"With the movement for reduced governmental spending gaining momentum everywhere and enlisting public support," he continued, "New Jersey could fare Director John Greene. not pick a more inopportune time to resort to this regressive type of tax. New Jersey consumers will not stand for new major raids on their pay envelopes through a general sales

"New Jersey's geographical position," Wilson explained, "makes it impossible for our retailers to survive any general sales tax, regardless of how low the percentage of the levy is. Such a broad general tax accelerates the drainage of business across our borders into New York and Pennsylvania, a condition against which New Jersey retailers are compelled constantly to fight.
