

## OBJECTIVES OF THE GOVERNORS' COMMITTEES CONFERENCE

The conference has a two-fold purpose. Its first objective is to inform the representatives of the Governors' Committees about the Hungarian Refugee Program. This orientation will include the functions of the President's Committee and the various Government, State and private agencies participating in the resettlement of the Hungarian refugees.

Its second objective is to inform the Chairmen of the many ways in which the Governors' Committees can be of assistance to the Sponsoring Agencies in the permanent resettlement and acceptance in the community of all refugees. Along with an exchange of ideas by the Chairmen on the operation of the committees in several States, the various agencies will discuss in detail the particular activities in the community in which the Governors' Committees can participate. These activities will include the following:

1. Vocational and Educational opportunities
2. Health and Welfare assistance
3. Information Service and Public Relations program
4. State Legislation

WELCOME TO OUR REFUGEE MESS

MESS 6 HAS BEEN IN OPERATION SINCE 19 DECEMBER 1956. IT HAS FED AN AVERAGE OF 1,500 REFUGEES DAILY DURING THAT PERIOD WITH A PEAK OF 3,079 FOR THE SUPPER MEAL ON 3 JANUARY 1957.

AT THE PRESENT TIME THE MESS IS FEEDING APPROXIMATELY 1,100 REFUGEES PER MEAL OF WHICH 350 ARE FAMILY GROUPS.

THE MESS HAS A DIET KITCHEN WHERE BABY FORMULAS ARE PREPARED. TWO STANDARD FORMULAS FOR BABIES OVER AND UNDER 3 MONTHS ARE MAINTAINED. IN ADDITION SPECIAL FORMULAS ARE MADE AS NECESSARY. STRAINED BABY FOOD IS AVAILABLE FOR THE SMALL CHILDREN.

THE FIRST MEAL FOR THE REFUGEES IN THE UNITED STATES IS FED AT THIS MESS. IT IS THE SAME MEAL THAT IS PROVIDED FOR ALL THE REFUGEES FOR THAT PARTICULAR DAY,,HOWEVER, IT HAS BEEN FOUND THAT THE INCOMING REFUGEES MUST BE GIVEN AN ALMOST DOUBLE PORTION. THE AMOUNT THEY EAT AFTER THAT SLOWLY DECREASES UNTIL THEY ARE SATISFIED WITH THE STANDARD PORTION WHICH YOU HAVE TODAY.
