Republican State Committee Strips Hoffman Of Power As Party Leader

Governor's Interest In Bruno Hauptmann Case Is Believed Cause

At yesterday's special meeting lasting three hours, the Republican State committee stripped Governor Harold Hoffman of his leadership in the G O P party As chairman Henry W Jeffers formally stated afterwards the committee will "assume its right ful place of leadership to exercise authority vested in it by law." ROB-INSON, ha cominciato la sua requisitoria citando ben a proposito il versetto della Genesi: "La voce e' certo quella di Giacobbe, ma mani sono le mani di Esau" Infatti tutto il brillantissimo discorso del Senatore ha fatto toccar con mano la contradizione patente nella quale si e' messo Alfred Smith che ha ora ripudiato in pratica un vangelo del quale prima aveva fatto l'apostolo,

F il Senatore Robinson ha avuto facile giuoco nel dimostrare che il programma odierno di Reosevelt e' proprio quello che lo Smith aveva adottato nella sua campagna elettorale del 1928, quando concorse alla Presidenza contro di Hoover.

UNDERGRADUATES AND THE ACCIDENT PROBLEM

Aggressive safe driving" campaigns are being inaugurated by students of a number of American uni versities and colleges. The old idea of the average college boy, which painted him as a rip-roaring irrespon sible, driving his flashy roadster at incredible speed while one arm encircled a blonde and one hand held a flask, was doubtless much exaggerated but it re mains a statistical truth that the most dangerous driv ers are those in their late teens and early twenties. If the menace of automobile accidents can be brought home to these drivers we will have taken an important step in curing the problem.

One of the campaigns is being conducted at Yale. where the Yale News, as distinguished an undergraduate newspaper as the country possesses, has is inefficiency, graft or over charging by a politically sued a pledge for students to sign. Signers of the pledge controlled and operated business as it is in a private agree to follow such simple, obvious, and yet vitally essential practices as to drive always at moderate speeds, never to pass on hills or curves, to stop at stop sign. and not "jump" traffic lights, and to be fair to all other drivers. Any driver, young, middle-aged or old, who follows these rules has a relatively small chance of becoming involved in a major automobile accident, due to his own carelessness.

It would be a great thing for the nation if every university saw the inauguration of such a campaign During the last two years we have killed more than 70.000 people in automobile accidents, and practically every one of those accidents was preventable. In every one of them human error, human failings, human irresponsibility, were the greatest contributing factors. The university students who are fighting auto accidents are setting an example that should be emulated not only by their fellows, but by their elders.

TAX-EXEMPTION PRIVILEGES UNFAIR

Taxation! What an ominous sound that word is beginning to have for millions of citizens.

Whenever government goes into any line of business new taxes are demanded and old business that can not compete with government goes out of existence and the taxes it paid are reassessed to remaining taxpayers, for government enterprises are generally tax-

This fact is becoming better understood every day and is the reason for a growing sentiment to make publicly owned business enterprises pay identically the same taxes that are paid by privately owned industry.

When government goes into business it has stepped outside the function of governing and the excuse for tax exemption privileges no longer exists. If state, municipal or federal business competes with private citizens, it should not be granted tax exemption and public subsidy privileges denied to private citizens.

Government owned business enterprises should stand on their own feet and be subject to the same regulation and taxation as are applied to private business

In 1923 the Degisc Wake and Wolda Sellassie organized a regular military expedition, with open threats, demanding considerable and immetate grants from Italy.

In 1926, 1926, while Italy was engaged in extensive police operations intended to suppress the rebellion of some migiurtine tribes and to ocoury definitely Northern Somalia, the Bihiopian Government took advanof this opportunity to supply the rebeis with arms and ammuni-tions. And it made no secret of this attitude, sings, once the rebellion was calmed, it granted lands and pen-aions to the childs of the rebel tribes who thus avoided the deserved

In 1391 it was the turn of the expedition organized by the Degiac Gabre' Mariam who threatened a surprise attack upon the Italian frontier along the Shebell.

There is no impartial observer who does not recognize the fact that a similar situation is altogether intoterable and la calculated to damage the prestige of a great power like Italy. And not only her prestige but her vital, legitimate interests. her rights which are universally recog nized, and the expansion which is justified by er geographical and demographical position and by her contributions throughout twenty centuries of history to the cause of civili-

It is a significant fact that that part of Africa in which the first Italian Colonies of Eritres and Somaldland were formed, is likewise the same in which intropid Italian explorers battled far and wide through out the last quarter of the past cen tury. The primacy of the exploration of that vast African triangle which has Cape Guardaful at its head, the Indian Ocean and the Fed Sea at its two sides and the Anglo Egyptian su dan at its foot, is Italian.

One steps beyond the normal limits of explorations when speaking of Pellegrino Matteucci, who in his first and second journey crossed Sudan and Abyssinia and in the third practically the whole of Africa. Arriving at Khartoum in March 1880 he seeded from there to Korodofan and Wadai, territories which at that were considered impenetrable owing to the cruelty of their population and above all on account of the hostility of their sultan towards the white race. From there accompanled by Massari, he abandoned the original idea of turning North, and reaching Tripoli and turned his atten tion to the exploration of the basins of Lake Chad and the Niger arriving at Bornu, he stayed there three months from there passing on to the regions of Socoto, Gura, Nupe' and came out at the key of Biafra, in the gulf of Guines.

In a moving passage from Alfredo Oriani, the great writer who understood better than any other the historic reasons for the Italian expansion in Africa, we are reminded of his heroic and gentle school mate.

"That march lasted a year, the desert was crossed, its casis, disappeared in the distance and there appeared rivers, fertile lands and paradistacal valleys. They passed through the whole of prehistory, the desert tance showed their virgin and inaccessible heights, the lakes extended their immensity like sees not yet na"There is no more honest group of

pid traveller, he burnt by day and froze by night. But the march went on. Hundreds and thousands of kilometres flowed behind him: the centre was passed by and another above and another sea awaited him. Africa wa vanquished, glory was conquered. Italy had discovered a new world.

Matteucci caught the germ of mortal illness from that prodigious pilgrimage, which he bore in his veine until his death in London. He was barely thirty years old at the time of his death (1820-1881), without having been able to reap the full scientific fruit of his great journey. He had gone through with it constantly bearing in mind the great honour which it would bring to Italy He maintained always, as he has writ ten, that he was serenely convinced of having performed, together with his companions, all his duties as a good Italian. We shall always be able to bonst of having borne the name of our falth, of our country and of our King throughout Africa.

If the last journey of Matteucci oversteps the limits of an exclusively national exploration, it is because its scientific importance assumed a universal character. The travels of another Italian, Giuseppe Sapeto, gave origin to the first colonial affirmations of resurrected Italy.

Born at Carcare, near Savons. in 1809. Sapeto, already over sixty years of age, stipulated the details of the purchase of the bay of Assab for the navigation company Rubattino, together with the sultans Ibrahim and Hassen; that acquisition was converted into a possession of the Italian State in 1882. The name of Sapeto is closely linked with the beginning of Italian colonial history. But if he accomplished that commission for the Rubattino company in 1869, it is due to the fact that he knew that part of Africa from his earliest youth when he wandered there as an explorer He disembarked at Massaua in 1838 and penetrated as far as the "Tigre', contracting an agreement with a local prince for King Louis Philippe of France. In '50 and '60 together with a missionary, he visited various Ethiopian countries on behalf of the Propaganda Fide, and then returned to Tigre' for Napoleon 111. Sut in the end Italy, now resurrected was able to exploit for herself th energetto accomplishments of this able son of her's.
