





#### New Variation Of An Old Favorite



SALMON RABBIT, delicious supper dish, doubles as a late night snack when served from a chafing dish. Crusty chunks of French bread are speared on the end of a fork and dipped into the hot mix-ture. If no chafing dish is available, use a pottery casserole set over a candle warmer to keep the "rabbit" hot.

Everybody loves cheese rabbit, or call it rarebit, if you will. But none is better than when the melted cheese is combined with tender flakes of colorful canned salmon. Once tried, it's a dish that becomes a family favorite that appeals to one and all.

SALMON RABBIT
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 small onion, minced
2 tablespoons flour 1 can (1 pound) salmon Salmon liquid from can

1 cup grated cheddar cheese 1/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste

1/4 cup cream

In saucepan melt butter or margarine. Add onion and saute for 10 minutes, or until onion is golden. Stir in flour. Drain intil onion is golden. #### AN ALCOHOLIC CAN RECOVER

Some 10 years ago, it was generally accepted that alcoholism was a moral issue. Today, with more understanding of alcoholism, more is being done to help alcoholics — medically, psychiatrically, institutionally, spiritually, and socially.

What you might do is learn all you can about the disease—so you can recognize a problem drinker, so you can counsel him, so you know where to guide him for help-

Information — unbiased and unexaggerated — is available from the National Council on Alcoholism, 2 East 103rd Street, New York 29, N. Y. This is a national, voluntary health organization, founded in 1944. It is not prohibitionist. Its concern is with the prevention of alcoholism, a disease.

The N. C. A. combats alcoholism through public and professional education, community services, guidance to the alcoholic and his family, and research. Committees on Alcoholism, set up in communities throughout the country, maintain centers where information and guidance can be obtained. The N. C. A even supplies information and personal direction on how to go about getting up such a committee.

Another organization that will give help is Alcoholics Anonymous, which has 4,5500 units in the United States and Canada. More than 30 states and many, many individual communities provide information and therapy. Many business firms, working with N. C. A. are helping to establish alcoholism programs and are making use of available facilities. The Salvation Army, too, has had a successful record in helping alcoholics.

An alcoholic **can** recover. He will never be able to drink again, but he can lead a normal, happy, and healthy life, without alcohol.


You don't help an alcoholic by nagging, scolding, lecturing, moralizing, or making empty threats. But getting an alcoholic to professional assistance, can be an important step toward his recovery.

A new husband might suffer through his young wife's daily culinary trials without comment. But he won't risk "experimental" pumpkin pie or giblet gravy with his Thanksgiving turkey. He wants, actually expects, velvet-textured pie and a smoothly-blended gravy "just like mother used to mother" with evaporated milk. ### We're Celebrating our CENTENNIAL and NEW JERSEY'S TERCENTENARY




