### LOVETT'S WHITE.

This Peach has proved so valuable we have consented to have it wear our name—the first fruit we have ever offered with the name of Lovett attached. It has been thoroughly tested and both in the North and South it is a sure and abundant bearer—yielding annually in Mass. and Conn. in orchards where almost all other varieties fail. We are confident it is the hardest purely white Peach yet produced. Season very late; color pure white; very large; splendid form, with indistinct suture; does not crack and is exceptionally free from spots or mildew. It is a long bearer; the flesh being firm, sweet and excellent and parts from the pit perfectly. It has the size and all the merits of Heath Cling, ripens with it and as it is a perfect free stone, handsomer, harder and of better quality, more abundant and regular bearer, it is bound to supersede that grand old sort.

**TONG-PA.**—(N.)—A new hardy peach from the mountains of Northern China. Medium to large; white with carmine cheek, handsome; flesh white, tender, sweet, good flavor. Said to be the hardest peach in cultivation. Price same as Muir.

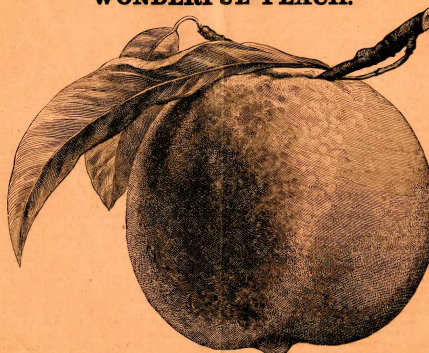
**YELLOW MYSTERY.**—From Maryland. Large, round, yellow with crimson cheek, strikingly handsome; flesh yellow, firm, luscious, of good quality. Tree vigorous and productive. Said to ripen eight days in advance of Froth's Early. Price same as Muir.

**LOVE ALL.**—From California. Large, round, yellow, firm, of fine quality. Excellent for canning. Price same as Muir.

**ELLISON.**—A handsome, valuable new peach, as large as Crawford's Late but ripening a little earlier. Yellow with rich blush; flesh yellow, acid and of fine quality. It reproduces itself truly from seed. The tree is a strong, vigorous and healthy grower, remarkably free from disease, and a regular bearer, blossoms late and is unusually hardy. **JAPAN PEACHES, Nos. 7, 9, 10, (N.)**—Three distinct sorts; from the cold regions of Northern Japan, and exceedingly hardy. White shaded with deep reddish brown; flesh white, of good quality. Prof. Budd of Iowa says they are 50 per cent harder than ordinary peaches and well worthy of extended trial. Price same as Muir.

The public in general, and fruit growers in particular, have for a long time, greatly needed a large, handsome and productive very late peach—one as large and beautiful as Crawford's Late, or Globe, as late as the Smock or later, and, withal, a reliable and heavy bearer. It is with joy, mingled with pride, we announce that, in the Wonderful, we have, in every particular, the fruit desired.

The Wonderful is a chance seedling, which with many others, appeared in the garden of a mechanic in Burlington County, New Jersey, several years ago, and proved so extraordinary in size and beauty, that it soon produced "a noise" at home. This reached the ears of a horticulturist residing in the County, who, on getting to see it in bearing, was at once filled with enthusiasm respecting its value, he secured specimens of it and placed them upon exhibition at the widely known "MONT HOLLY FAIR." Here it received such universal and marked attention as to have well nigh created an excitement; receiving not only the highest money premium of the society, but a special prize of a **Silver Medal** also.

The variety may be described as follows:

**Size;** large to very large—best specimens, from crowded trees, measuring eleven inches in circumference, and weighing as many ounces.

**Form;** smooth, almost globular (a little oblong) with faint suture and slightly pointed apex; very regular and uniform in both size and shape, even upon overloaded trees.

**Color;** richest golden yellow, largely overpaved with vivid carmine, with marblings of crimson—beautiful in the extreme.

**Season;** late to very late; succeeding the Smock and ripening in central New Jersey the second week in October, and keeping in good condition as long as three weeks after gathered.

**Flavor;** yellow, rich, high flavored and delicious, exceedingly firm, parts from the stone with perfect freedom, and is bright red around the pit.

**Brown;** deeply furrowed and medium to small; the smallest of the late varieties.

**Tree;** of strong, vigorous growth; a regular annual bearer, and so prolific as to require the limbs to be braced in all directions to sustain the weight of fruit.

In addition to being of inestimable value as a market fruit, it is absolutely without a rival for evaporating or canning; being of deep, solid flesh, perfectly free, small stones and highly colored at the pit.

As Jerseymen, we are highly pleased that our State, which has produced Crawford's Early, and Late, Mountain Rose, Oldtime Free, Stump the World, Koyote White, Jones' Smock, and so many other valuable peaches, should also have produced the long looked-for boon to fruit growers and the public; this remarkable, this truly "Wonderful" Peach.

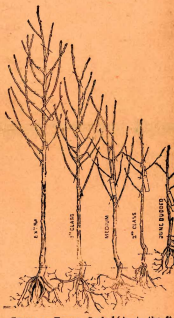
As both the soil and climate of New Jersey combine in the best development and growth of the peach, we grow them in vast numbers and are therefore enabled to supply trees at the low prices quoted, surpassed by none and equaled by few.

In growing the peach we use stones of natural fruit only, and land where Peach Trees have never been grown before. See the annexed figure of natural stone (sprouted). Seedlings from budded fruit are by no means so vigorous and are apt to be tainted with the "yellow."

We are close to the ocean and its modifying influence is such that our peach trees are not injured by the secret winter.



June budded trees are those budded in June, cut back and the top formed the same year that the seed is planted. Though small in size, they are beautifully rooted, and succeed nearly or quite as well as the larger trees which are a year older; unless when planted at the far North in Autumn.
