Dear Ellen:

In your report of December 18, 1944, about the number of Japanese Americans at Seabrook Farms, I could not make out whether the 13 children who are working were included in your "Total Number Employed Japanese Americans" that is 588. It seems to me that the 13 children were not included in the 588. Is this correct? If so, the report might more accurately be set up as I have done it below:

Would you let me know if the way I have done it is correct? I am giving a copy of this letter to Mr. Chapman so that he can discuss it with you.

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In the foregoing figures taken from your report of December 18th, the "Total Housed in Family Dwellings" is 542 and the "Total Workers Housed in Dormitories" is 262 making a total of 804 people living in family units and dormitories. As the total population is 817, there are 13 whose housing accommodations are not indicated in your report. Could you let us know where the 13 are housed?
