District Chief, New Jersey and Delaware, Industrial Furnace Section. U. S. Fuel Administration.

Member of Pyrometer Committee, National Research Council.

War Problem, No. 146, dealing with the enameling of zinc, was also assigned to me by the National Research Council.

Our Laboratory was also placed at various times at the disposal of the U. S. Shipping Board for work in connection with concrete ships, and to the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture for tests on coke, used in gas masks.

Please use your own judgment in reference to the publication of the whole or a part of the above.
