You have such a Rooseveltian way of going about procuring a letter that one cannot possibly resist writing so I am taking a few precious minutes to drop you a line.

I have no news of Rutgers men and, in fact, have not even come in contact with one since leaving Ft. Meyer over a year ago. So, you see, the director's letters have been all the more welcome and have kept fresh the memories of Rutgers students who have so rapidly transpired to fighting men. Without doubt they, like myself, would like to return after the war and redeem an unbroken line of red marks on the last report but I am afraid that in only too many cases the Army will have to constitute the finishing school for the business life that is to come.

Here at Sevier the 20th Div. is forming. We hope to move east rapidly and soon. That is all.

Section, U. S. Fuel Administration.


Member of Pyrometer Committee, National Research Council.
