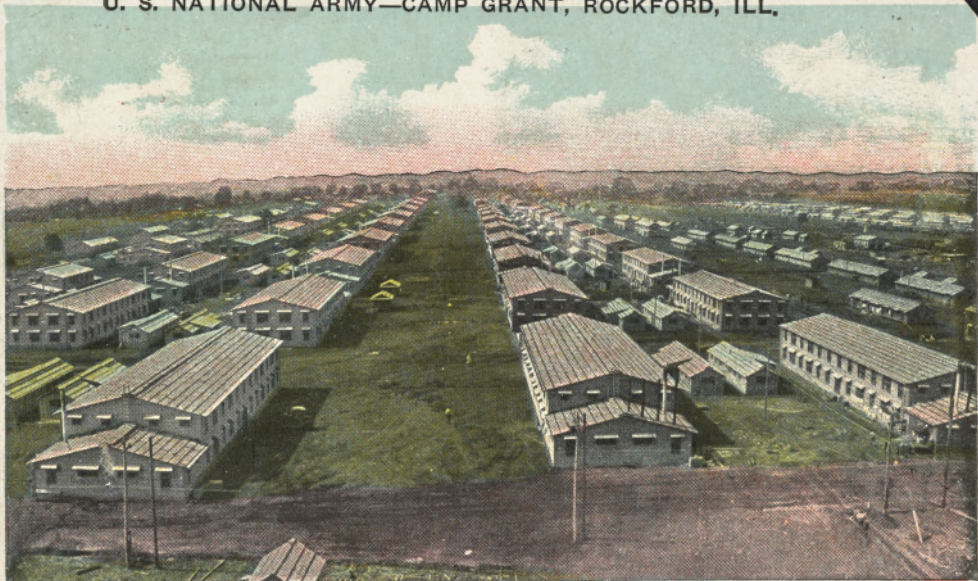

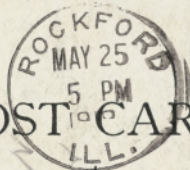

my dear Mr. Silvers,

It is high time  
for me to write. News from the  
College is a rare treat here. My  
Brother wrote me <sup>about</sup> of the College fellows  
starts even the day the Armistice  
was signed. I could almost imagine  
myself there while it was going  
on.

By a strange misfortune it has  
been my lot to be with men  
of the central West and of the  
South. I didn't get a chance to get  
into the Scrap. I have hesitated  
to write on that account. The  
"Flu" occupied my time when I  
should have been giving my Brother



regards from Rutgers. After getting out of the Hospital ~~and~~ I went to the Second Corps School at Chatillon sur Saône and while at school the Division returned to the States, so I was transferred to a Southern Division the 8<sup>th</sup> the Wildcat.

Life is fairly tolerable pending the ~~interim~~ interim between hostilities and the return to the States. We drill a little - minus the old prep a little - we play a little, shoot a little study a little and spend most of the rest of the time elaborating on rumors that deal with our going home, and complaining about their fallacy.
