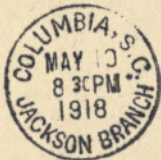
Mr. E. J. DeWitt,

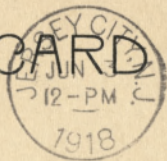
In answer to yours of April 18,

SAUMUR ARTILLERY SCHOOL

AMERICAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCES

Saumur, France
Aug. 6, 1918.

Dear Silvers

I've been rather negligent in sending you my overseas address, as I promised. We've been over here nearly two months now, but only recently arrived at this station.

There are a number of Putgers men here now. Spague '16, Jack Voorhees '16, Walrath, '14, VanKuren '09 and I. Not many, 'tis true, but yet enough that we can get together once in while and talk over old times.

We are in a very historic and picturesque part of the country - but nearly every locality is that over here. You can find someone who will tell you all sorts of tales of oldentimes. Some of them may be true - or not. It is not difficult to find some way of using up week-ends as there is always something to visit.

Our school work is very interesting. It keeps us pretty busy all week, though. This school might be called the Offord of the Artillery world - everything is of the best.
