Dear Silvers,

This acknowledges receipt of yours
last and conveys my appreciation of its heavy
contents. As you see by the address I am
in the officers school here. And of course you
know that the Coast Artillery ranks
high in the Service and next to Aviation.
They are working us accordingly. Honestly
the way we are compelled to absorb dope on the Big
guns into Material course and the speed necessary
to finish the problems in Orientation, which
is another name for precise surveying will furnish
us something to think about when the War is over.

My real reason for writing is to endorse
hope on the school here as we were asked
to do and to ask you to send down any men
who are looking for a real, live high grade
job in Uncle Sam's Army. A company of
250 men enter here every week.
about 60% are graduated ten weeks
later. A man ought to be a Regular fellow,
a "He" in other words and must know his
Trig. perfectly. Surveying of course helps
a lot because if his average in orientation
falls below 65 he is chucked out.

There are about 1600 men in camp
now but of course plans must be made
for the future personnel so we are asked to
try and get new men for the school. Just
ask them to write to Col. Welshimer
and he will make it possible for them
to be inducted into service immediately.

If any men at Camp Dix etc want to
transfer you might advise them. I see
Wendell E. Phillips, Squirt Worth and a
tall Buddy named Cook very often.
