your letter concerning Military Service. I have recently received word from Washington which, I think, covers your inquiry. It is probable that another series of Officers Training Camps will be held but definite arrangements have not been made. The Adjutant-General has advised me that appointments will probably be made from certain designated colleges and from enlisted men. The rule set down in Washington is that undergraduates and graduates of Rutgers must have had at least two years of military training in college before they can be recommended. You can not therefore be recommended from the college at the present time.

If, however, you are drafted, that puts you in another category and you can make application through the college as a man already in the service of the United States. We may recommend our alumni who have enlisted or who have been drafted, whether they took our military course or not.

The only thing for you to don therefore, as far

as the Training Camp is concerned is to wait until you are drafted and then, if the college is permitted to recommend men, you may send your application to Major Bigelow. As soon as we hear whether or not Rutgers is designated as one of the colleges which may make recommendations I shall write you. I hope that you will keep in touch with me wherever you may be.

Training Camp but the men recommended must have had at least one year of military training at Rutgers College. There is, therefore, no way we can get around the ruling and place you our list. I should be very glad to do something but it is impossible. I do not know of the headquarters of the camp in New York City. I hardly think there are any as recommendations are to be made through the army cantonments and from the colleges themselves. I am sorry that I cannot give you more favorable news.
