Well about this place here. It is a wonderful place, with great climate, one day bathing suits are the style and a few days later overcoats feel good. Rain, only once in awhile but they do it proper then. There are about 160 medical corps men here at the hospital and 100 of them are in quarantine for measles so you can imagine that the

most of us are doing a little
work. The whole Post includes
about 6500 men, mostly coast
artillery. We have all kinds
of schools here and they aggregate
about 1600. Rutgers is well
represented here by Withers,
Anderson, Talifer and James.
There are some others here
I believe but they are the
only ones I've seen so far.
The first three mentioned
will be leaving this fall soon
I hope.

There is an officers training
camp at Camp Lee which I
expect to attend after Oct
4th. It's chiefly and possibly a
chance for quick course duty
with a machine gun battalion.
At present I'm a corporal here
and expect to get my company
soon.
