Mr. Earl Silvers Director of Was Service,

Dear Vir,

I received two letters from you, which gave me an idea of what my alma mater is doing in this

hue of strain and hardship. I want to thank you for these tokens which

have kept my eyes still gazing on Old Acueus.

Army life has become a habit with me, but I cannot imagine how it would be to go to college at the call of the bugle. I ever I get an opportunity to come east, I

shall wend my way to thew Brunswick and toshew my old friendships. I have been at laup grant since September 25th and during This period I have received an additional month's training to unprove my efficiency. at first I was attached to the Depot Brigade, but This only lasted two weeks. During This Time We had no men to drill as half of the ruen in the company had the affluencya and the other half were rueded for special duties. Then I was transfered to a company composed entirely of Shave Jails " I have been in This company ever suice, We were in quarantine five weeks oy account of the epidemic, This provisional company was formed with the idea of instructing these officers who had become idle because of the Sullicuza.

Sam, Burr, 19, is in my company and It, Post, '20, is in The Hund Provisional Company which is loce 29 West, I passed your uners to these Kutgers men anothey also received some news of our college. The first week we were instructed in musketry which is the study of The modern Enfield Rifle, The second week we got paper work instruction, then a week of gas warfare, and inthe past week bayonet work. There are rumars floating about that we may be transferred to other camptin a few welks of such is the case I shall let you know of any change of address,

I shall send a money order for Two (2) dollars. One dollar for the alcuni quarterly and the other for some other Rulgers man in the service. I shall hold this letter and enclose the order payable to you. Let me know again in the near future any news of Rutgers: of there is a spare copy I should. like to get a look at the new Fargun.
