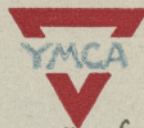

I broke my fountain pen so couldn't do any better than this. But what I want to know is about college leave. I'm not sure that I want to come back but would like to have it go thru anyway. I am now in my training regiment that takes four weeks and you can't leave in that time. I just started last Monday. Now I have college leave on my enlistment or on my papers. But Joe Buckley said you had to get a letter from the President saying that you were taking up an essential course. Now my course will include Navigation, Mechanics, Astronomy, & Drill. All of this are essential to the Navy.
