

I am enclosing herewith a paragraph from a letter which came to hand recently from Dr. Carl R. Fellers, who was one of our graduate students last year.

"I am still with the U. S. Public Health Service as Sanitary Inspector and Bacteriologist. I like the work very much. Something new is always turning up, for example to day I found some vendors of ice cream selling a product testing 1.2% butter fat and consisting mainly of gelatin, starch, sugar and coloring matter. Another case for the Court. I am getting good practice in legal food and sanitary work as we usually have someone up before the magistrate every day or so. The Bureau recently raised my salary to \$150 per month and have designated me to Gastonia, N. C. where an artillery camp is soon to be located. I shall have charge of Sanitation in the city and camp zone. I recently received notice that my name is #1 on the Civil Service lists as Sanitary Bacteriologist, so I expect that I shall receive a permanent appointment soon."

Dear Mr. Silvers:

In compliance with your request of the 10th inst., I am submitting herewith the following memorandum concerning my participation in government activities pertaining to the conduct of the War.

1. During the year 1918 I served as County Chairman of Middlesex County in the War Savings campaign.

2. During the same period I served as member of the Agriculture and Fertilizer Committees of the National Research County, which was included in the organization of the Council of National Defense. Since the reorganization of the National Research Council, I have been appointed Chairman of the Fertilizer Committee of the Council.

3. Since the signing of the armistice I was appointed by the Ordnance Department as Special Investigator on the use of fixed nitrogen products. Under orders of the Nitrate Division of the Ordnance Department I investigated during a period of about three months the uses of certain fixed nitrogen products in a number of the European countries.

4. During the period of the War I served as member of state, county and local committees of the Liberty Loan, Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross organizations.
