Dear Sir:-

I have been receiving all College publications on an average of about two months late. This is due to the fact that the majority of them have been sent to my residence at Elizabeth, N.J. or to Camp Lee, Va., which I left November 27th. 1917.

I was at Camp Lee for three months and from there I was sent to Langley Field at Hampton, Va., for instruction in Aerial Bombing. I remained there six weeks and was then sent to Washington, D.C. for duty in the office of the Chief Signal Officer.

Remained in Washington three months, until such time as the oppression of Swivel Chair Officers became so great that all officers in side the draft age were placed on field duty. From Washington I was sent to Ellington Field, for duty in the Bombing School, and was in charge of Production and Supply of Dummy Bombs for use at this field. After two months in this capacity I was relieved and placed in command of the 2nd, Cadet Squadron.

To my knowledge there is only one other Rutgers man at this field. That is Lt. Colville, 1916, who is receiving training as a Bombing Pilot and who is now in the 2nd..Cadet Squadron .

If possible I should like to have all circular letters and the Commencement Number of the Targum sent direct to me at this field.

In the future I will endeavor to keep you notified of any change of station that may occur.
