My dear Demarest,

I noticed in the papers recently that the state colleges will be asked to supply men to the third officer's training camp from among their alumni. You very kindly gave me a recommendation of character last spring to accompany an application for the officer's reserve corps which I made. The regulations

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were changed, requiring applicants to undergo the three months intensive training. Simultaneous with the return of my application came a request from the minister, whom I served the year after graduation, to supply in his church during the summer.

I went west and preached during July and August, hoping that this would help me in deciding my future course.

I was drafted in September. I came home immediately.

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and am now located
at camp V.4.

I have enjoyed my-
self immensely. I feel
the experience will be
invaluable to me in
the years to come. Un-
der the circumstances
I wouldn't have it chang-
ed were such possible.
I feel strongly I want
to be of maximum
service. And that is
my point. If I, with
my college and
military training
at Rutgers, can serve
my country best as
an officer, I want
to train to be an of-

Here is a short note from an alumnus who fought the war in Lancaster, Pa.


And right at the beginning, I will give you a bit of news that, by the way, affects my pay-check--in addition to being married I am now first Lieutenant.
