They fed her champagne, took Ex-Rays and conspired in a hundred different ways to relieve me of my "141.67". Along with the hospital bill came the notification of my promotion and "Wife" breathed a prayer of thanksgiving--"The Lord will provide".

The war is over: Sorry I haven't been able to add to your collection of relics. If there is anything this side of Europe that you would like to have, let me know.

Sorry to hear of the deaths of some of our boys, particularly of Dutch Elmer. You probably will remember that he was a "Beta", and you probably will not remember that he was from South Jersey, and better yet, from Atlantic City High School.
