Mr. Perkins will be taken as a member of this camp on exactly the same conditions as others. Board and tuition for summer course will be \$150. If he is the type of man indicated in your letter he will be given opportunity to command, but hotexclusive opportunity, as there will be a number of other men in camp in exactly the same condition. The opportunity to command on the part of the student in camp is a privilege from which he derives more benefit than he would were he in the ranks. as head of the Military Department I certainly shall not recommend that the University remit the Kuition of any student on account of his ability to command. yours Sincerely
