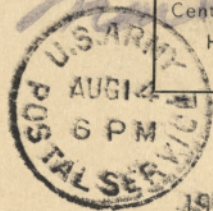

My dear Reed:

Since I learned of the death of Lester^{lie} Shultz of the Class of 1915, it seemed to me that the college should render some special honor to his memory, if it is true that his death was indirectly the result of his overseas service. According to reports he contracted pneumonia because of the weakened condition of his lungs resulting from his being gassed. If this is true it seems to me that he deserves a place on the College Honor Roll along with the men who gave their lives while they were in active service.

I do not know of course whether it would be exactly the right thing to include his name on the honor roll especially since there are likely to be other men whose death may be the indirect result of theirⁱⁿ service, but I do feel strongly that some special recognition should be given toⁱⁿ this instance. I feel especially interested in Shultz because he was a fellow of such^{such} fine spirit and devotion to the college. His death is certainly a great loss.

I should like to know what you think of this suggestion.
