disappointed. You are very
uncertain as to your move
in the army.

In Paris the night ^{the day} that
President Wilson made his
triumphal entry. They cer-
tainly gave him a great-
reception and the people
seemed even more jubilant
than the night of his armistice,
when they couldn't seem
to realize it was true. It was

of fortune for me in being
there as Paris is closed to
the U.S. army and it took
a little close figuring. Before
