In reply to yours of the 8th I will give you the information that you requested. My son George W. Winslow was born in Atlanta Ga Feb 27. 1893. We moved back north when he was a young child locating in Boyerne N.J. where he attended the Public School up to the grade of the High we then moved to Elizabeth and he entered the Dutton High School from which he graduated then entered Rutgers College.

In the summer of 1912 he went into W.R. Grace & Co with the intention of returning to Rutgers in the fall but was so favorably placed there decided to remain with them, he left ^{in June 1913} there to join the Seventh N.Y. Regiment and went to Spartanburg S.C. with them. He was corporal in Co F 107th infantry 27th Division and was killed

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in action Sept 29, 1918 when the 27th, 30th
divisions broke the Hindenburg line.

The only military experience
that he had previous to this was the summer
at Plattsburg 1915 when he was in the Sept-
camp.

From the time that he went to Plattsburg
to the end of his life he was greatly interested
in military work.

A recent letter from a friend in
the same company informed us that the
battle that he was in was the severest fought
by any regiment. We are enclosing a clipping
describing the battle also two pictures of him.
Kindly return them.

Corporal George W. Winslow (1,211,503) Co. 1, 107th infantry. Killed in action October 1, 1918.

For courage and determination in action during the battle of the HINDENBURG LINE, September 29, 1918. During the battle this noncommissioned officer displayed coolness and qualities of leadership in organizing and directing groups of men in a heavy smoke barrage, continuing in action after xbeing wounded in the wrist, and until killed. x
