was Sgt. Burch '20. He was with an Ambulance Unit that was formed in Allentown. After the Chateau Thierry drive, we lost track of one another. Sgt Burch was in the best of health and enjoying his work.

We have been on three different fronts within last few months Chateau Thierry, St. Michel and the Argonne Forest. The latter was by far the worst and it seemed as if the division would never be relieved.

A little over a month ago we left France for Germany, where the old Fourth Division

is at the present date. While going through Lorraine we saw some beautiful country. In some parts the feeling toward the Allies is none to good, and the results of fifty years occupation by the Huns is plainly evident.

Trusting that this will be one of the most prosperous year the college has ever known, and wishing for you a Bright New Year, I am

there are fully a thousand Americans
