REQUESTS TO GOVERNOR FLORIO CONCERNING A1232 & OUR RIGHT-TO-KNOW LAW

The New Jersey Right-to-Know & Act Coalition, representing 160 labor, community, emergency response, and public health organizations, requests that Governor Florio adopt a four point approach toward dealing with the current attack on the New Jersey Worker and Community Right-to-Know law:

- 1) Publicly oppose statutory changes to the law, publicly oppose A.1232, and commit to veto it if it passes the legislature. Contact Assemblypersons Doria and Shinn and inform them of progress in issuing regulations (#2).
- 2) Publicly support regulatory changes that would reduce certain employer burdens without endangering public health. A list of such changes supported by the Coalition has been previously given to the Department of Health and to your staff. Immediately ask the Department of Health to expedite changes to the right-to-know rules so that proposed rules (prior to publication in the N.J. Register) could be circulated by January 12, 1993. This approach should also be used with DEPE right-to-know regulations.
- 3) Utilize part of the current reserves in the Right-to-Know Trust Fund to provide compatible computer equipment and training for Local Emergency Planning Committees to assist emergency responders in dealing with chemical spills and fires.
- 4) Support current DEPE Bureau of Pesticide Control efforts to provide farmworkers right-to-know training and information via the regulatory process.
