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STATE FEDERATION DONATES FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS TO WOMAN'S COLLEGE
Gives That Sum to Furnish Library in Recitation Hall. ~~####~~Forty-seven
Freshmen Students Already Enrolled

New Brunswick, N.J. August 13 (Special). The State Federation of Woman's Clubs has given the sum of five hundred dollars for the complete refurnishing of the library in Recitation Hall, the main building of the new College for Women here, and work has already begun on the room. It will be finished in buff and blue, the colors of the Federation, and will be supplied with mahogany furniture trimmed with continental blue.

Other improvements and changes are already noticed about the college campus. The trees and bushes on the spacious grounds have been trimmed, a new lighting system is being installed in Recitation Hall, and a new pantry and kitchen is being built in the Cooper dormitory. The Registrar's office has been established on the campus where an average of twenty to thirty visitors are entertained every day.

The registration has so far surpassed the most optimistic estimate of Mrs. Mabel S. Douglass, the Dean. Already forty-seven students have enrolled for the Freshman class, exclusive of those who will take the Home Economics Course. As there is no tuition fee for this latter course, it is expected that the enrollment will almost double when full announcement of the vocational studies is made.

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PLANS PROGRESSING FOR WOMAN'S COLLEGE.

Interest in the newly established College for Women in New Jersey was given an added impetus this week when seventy-five of the most prominent women of the State met in New Brunswick and inspected the grounds and buildings of New Jersey's latest educational institution. Mrs. William S. Douglass, Dean of the College, announced that Freshman courses will be offered next year and that the college will open its doors on September 18th.

The announcement was received with considerable enthusiasm, as practically every woman present had labored long and earnestly for the founding of just such a college. Their enthusiasm was considerably increased after an inspection of the campus and buildings, which are admirably fitted for an institution of higher education.

A beautiful estate of eleven acres overlooking the Raritan River has been secured as a site of the new college. A brownstone mansion of twenty-two rooms is located in the very center of the wooded grounds and will be used as a recitation hall, and dormitory. Another residence, directly across the street from the main building, has been secured as a dormitory and dining room, and will be ready for occupancy in the fall. Besides these two buildings, the Woman's College will be given the use of the vocational and scientific laboratories on the adjoining campus of the State University, and will thus have the unusual advantages of completely equipped laboratory facilities.

Mrs. Douglass, together with Mrs. Elisabeth N. Greene, the Registrar, is already located in the main building and is supervising the renovation of the hall. Applications for admission to the new college are being received from every part of the State, and a number sufficient to insure the opening of classes in September is already assured.

Three courses will be offered; a Liberal Arts Course, a Teachers' Course, and a Home Economics Course, all leading to degrees and all requiring four years of study. Graduates of approved high schools and preparatory schools will be admitted on certificate, or can take the entrance examinations which will be given in New Brunswick in September. They must be able to offer three credits in English, two in Algebra, and one in Geometry. Other credits to the total of fifteen may be offered in Latin, Greek, German, Spanish, French, Science, and Mathematics.

The students will live and eat in the college dormitory, where the cost of room and board will be from eight to nine dollars per week. The tuition and other fees will amount to one hundred and forty dollars per year.

The College for Woman will have a faculty of its own, which will be supplemented by professors from Rutgers College. Chairs in English, Mathematics, Chemistry, Biology, and Home Economics have yet to be filled, but will be announced shortly.

The new college promises to fill a long felt need in the educational system of the State. Its admirable situation, beautiful grounds and buildings, and the prestige it will receive as a department of the State University of New Jersey, assure it a long and useful life.

WOMAN'S COLLEGE OPENS WITH FORMAL EXERCISES
ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.
