General Peyton C. March, Chief of Staff, today approved, by order of the Secretary of War, a plan for the organization of a Student Army Training Corps in the educational institutions of the country to train men as officers and technical experts in the army. The plan for the Student Army Training Corps, as altered to conform to the plans of the War Department for lowering the draft age, will utilize the plant, equipment, and organization of the colleges to maintain a reservoir of officer material for training, from which it will be possible to meet the large needs of the various branches of the service.

The length of time during which men will be trained in the colleges will depend upon the needs of the service. As fast as one group of trained men is drawn from the college into the service their places will be taken by a new quota obtained by voluntary induction or through the draft. In this way the educational facilities of the country will be used to maintain a constant supply of ~~men~~ men who are trained to meet the needs of the army.

Under the regulations provided for the Student Army Training Corps selected young men who are physically fit for military service, who are 18 years of age or over, and who have had a grammar school education may be voluntarily inducted into the army and enter upon a course of special training. Those who have had a grammar school education but no more will ordinarily enter Special Training Detachments to be trained along mechanical lines of military value. These Detachments will become a part of the Student Army Training Corps and young men who prove in the course of their mechanical training that they are officer material may be transferred to a unit in one of the colleges to be prepared to enter a Central Officers Training Camp.

Young men who have had at least a high school education will be allowed to enter the colleges for more advanced training as officers and as technical experts of various kinds, according to their experience and abilities. Those men who show promise under this training will be kept in college until qualified to enter Central Officers' Training Camps or to go directly into the service as technical experts. Those who do not will be sent either to Non-commissioned Officers' Schools or to the nearest Depot Brigade or, in case they show special technical or mechanical ability, to the detachments where men are trained for such work.

Arrangements will be made for transferring from the Depot Brigades to units of the Student Army Training Corps men whose rating in the examinations indicate them to be officer material but not yet ready to enter Central Officer Training Camps. Every effort will be made to give every young man who enters the service under this plan opportunity for the training best suited to his natural ability and preferences in order to enable him to serve the country in the most efficient way.



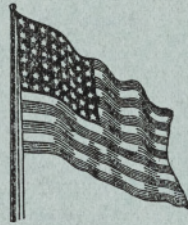

Dear Alumnus:

We wish to call to your attention the proposed publication of the SERVICE RECORD of Holy Cross College in the War of 1917.

This book, which will be published Memorial Day, if possible, is to be a handsomely bound volume of 450 pages, produced at a cost of approximately \$5,000, and will contain over 750 illustrations, mostly photographs of the Holy Cross graduates, students and former students who have served in the War of 1917.

You may be agreeably surprised to learn that our Honor Roll contains 936 names at this writing. These figures represent men in uniform and do not include those who served in civilian capacity, nor do they include the 750 students in the S. A. T. C. and S. N. T. C. This is a record of which you and Holy Cross may be justly proud.

Over 800 complete records and 735 individual photographs have been received. Two records and two pictures (when available) will be on each page, except in the case of the 24 men who made the supreme sacrifice. We shall honor each of them with a full page. The book will also contain a foreword about the part Holy Cross College, in her patriotic alumni, students and faculty, took in the late war, with a brief resumé of Civil War activities. The second part of the book is devoted to the Students Army Training Corps and Naval Unit at Holy Cross College, concluding with a comprehensive table of statistics.

One of the features of the SERVICE RECORD is the provision made for possible additions. Records have been received, in some instances, unaccompanied by pictures. We have printed the record in each case, leaving a space for the picture, in the hope that at a future date some friend might send us a photograph. When such picture is received, copies will be made and one sent to each subscriber to be entered in each SERVICE RECORD. Should an entirely new record be received, a new page will be printed and distributed for addition (on the adhesive stubs) at the end of the book. In this way, the SERVICE RECORD can always be made more and more complete, without disfiguring the book.

The National Catholic War Council, through its Committee on Historical Records, has assured us that Holy Cross College is a pioneer in publishing a *complete* service record and that our publication will serve as a model for other institutions.

No effort has been spared to make this SERVICE RECORD complete in every detail. Every trick of the printer's and engraver's art has been employed to insure an artistic production worthy of this historical document. The individual records are statements of *fact* and not fanciful imagination.

In a few years the value of this publication will be infinitely precious. It will be a veritable mine of information for future chroniclers of Alma Mater's glories; a source of constant edification and inspiration to succeeding generations of students; and to the service men and their relatives a keepsake of inestimable worth.

As a guide, therefore, in producing this imposing volume, we wish to learn the views of the alumni and their friends. The number of copies ordered by us will be determined by the number of subscriptions received before May 1st. The charge is nominal, five dollars per copy, postage prepaid.
